CALL TO ORDER AND ROLL CALL

Mayor Giles called the regular meeting of the McCall City Council to order at 5:30 p.m. Mayor Giles, Council Member Maciaszek, Council Member Nelson, Council Member Nielsen, and Council Member Thrower all answered roll call.

Mayor Giles led the audience in the Pledge of Allegiance.

APPROVE THE AGENDA

Council Member Maciaszek moved to approve the agenda as submitted. Council Member Nielsen seconded the motion. In a voice vote, all members voted aye, and the motion carried.

8. AB 23-058 City Licenses Report to Council Per McCall City Code

Per McCall City Code Title 4 Chapter 9, the City Council has determined the City Clerk shall be delegated the authority to process and grant or deny all alcoholic beverage license applications, other than certain circumstances involving catering permits, which the City Clerk shall review the application for catering permit for completeness and forward said application to the Police Chief. The Police Chief upon receipt of the application shall make a recommendation to the City Clerk to approve or deny the application. Whenever the City Clerk shall determine that an application for alcoholic beverage license transfer or renewal is complete, the City Clerk shall approve or deny such application. All decisions of the City Clerk shall be reported to the City Council at the next regularly scheduled City Council meeting after such a decision. The City Clerk is also responsible for all processing of business, taxi, snow removal, pawnbroker, child daycare licenses, vendor and short-term rental permits, and public event applications. *Action: review the license report*.

9. AB 23-059 Treasurer's Report as Required by IC 50-208

Treasurer's report of accounts and activity of office during the month of February 2023 regarding care, management, or disposition of sums of money, property, or business of the City. *Action: Review the report.*

10. AB 23-063 Request to Proclaim April 2023 as Fair Housing Month

The Idaho Department of Commerce asks each community in Idaho to publish a Fair Housing Proclamation each April to raise awareness of everyone's entitlement to Fair Housing. Title VIII of the Civil Rights Act of 1968 (Fair Housing Act), as amended, prohibits discrimination in the sale, rental, and financing of dwellings, and in other housing-related transactions, based on race, color, national origin, religion, sex, familial status (including children under the age of 18 living with parents or legal custodians, pregnant women, and people securing custody of children under the age of 18), and disability. Action: Proclaim April 2023 as Fair Housing Month in the City of McCall and authorize the Mayor to sign the proclamation.

11. AB 23-064 Request to Proclaim April 16-22, 2023 As Volunteer Week in the City of McCall

National Volunteer Week began in 1974 as a way to recognize and celebrate the efforts of volunteers. Since then, the original emphasis on celebration has widened; the week has become a nationwide effort to urge people to get out and volunteer in their communities. Every April, charities and communities reinforce the week's official theme ("United We Serve") by recognizing volunteers and fostering a culture of service. President Richard Nixon established National Volunteer Week with an executive order in 1974. Every sitting U.S. president since Nixon has issued a proclamation during National Volunteer Week, as have many U.S. mayors and governors, urging Americans to give their time to community outreach organizations. The City of McCall would like to recognize its many volunteers that serve on the City's

Committees, Commissions, and Boards. These volunteers are a representative group of stakeholders from a particular segment of the community appointed to provide comments and advice on city projects or issues. The City of McCall has standing 2 Boards, 3 Commissions, and 8 Advisory Committees which have a total of 72 volunteers who serve our community. The City is having a Volunteer Appreciation event on April 12th to honor all the city's many volunteers. Action: Proclaim April 16-22, 2023 As Volunteer Week in the City of McCall and authorize the Mayor to sign the proclamation.

12. AB 23-067 Request to approve Agreement for Idaho Department of Environmental Quality Source Water Protection Grant

The Idaho Department of Environmental Quality has awarded the City of McCall Public Works Department a Source Water Protection Grant in the amount of \$19,629 to purchase a hydrocarbon sensor and security cameras to be installed at the water intake station in Legacy Park. In the event of marine spillage, the hydrocarbon sensor will detect the presence of gasoline in the water before the water enters the water treatment system. The video cameras will help deter and document the water intake facility from human interference. No local cash match is required for the grant. Action: Approve the Idaho Department of Environmental Quality Source Water Protection Grant Agreement and authorize the Mayor to sign all necessary documents.

Council Member Nelson moved to approve the Consent Agenda as submitted. Council Member Maciaszek seconded the motion. In a roll call vote, Council Member Nelson, Council Member Maciaszek, Mayor Giles, Council Member Nelson, and Council Member Thrower all voted aye, and the motion carried.

PUBLIC COMMENT

Mayor Giles called for public comment at 5:33 p.m.

One (1) written comment was received and is included as Attachment 1.

Hearing no comments, Mayor Giles closed the comment period at 5:33 p.m.

PUBLIC HEARING

AB 23-065 Request to Adopt an Ordinance Approving CA-22-03: Amendments to Title III of McCall City Code related to Service Stations within the Scenic Route Overlay Zone

Council Member Nielsen moved to open the public hearing for CA-22-03: Amendments to Title III of McCall City Code related to Service Stations within the Scenic Route Overlay Zone. Council Member Nelson seconded the motion. In a roll call vote, Council Member Nielsen, Council Member Nelson, Mayor Giles, Council Member Maciaszek, and Council Member Thrower all voted aye, and the motion carried.

City Planner Brian Parker presented to Council. At the November 17, 2020 meeting, City Council conducted a public hearing for CA-20-03 for various zoning code amendments including,

"3.7.033: PROHIBITED USES: The following use is prohibited in the Scenic Route Zone: Service station." The hearing was continued to the January 14, 2021 meeting at which time the City Council decided to approve all the code amendments in CA-20-03 without the proposed addition of Section 3.7.033, which would have prohibited service stations along scenic routes. The City Council asked that Section 3.7.033 be remanded back to the McCall Area Planning and Zoning Commission for further study on the issue. The McCall Area Planning & Zoning Commission conducted a work session on the subject code amendment on December 6, 2022. Based on feedback from the work session meeting, staff developed the proposed code language. The proposed code amendment was presented to the McCall Area Planning & Zoning Commission during their regularly scheduled February 7, 2023 meeting, and the code amendment was unanimously recommended for approval to the McCall City Council.

Council Member Thrower asked Planner Parker for clarification on the definition of a service station. There is confusion as to what a service station is vs. what a service station is not. Planner Parker noted Chevron is a good example of a business that meets all the various criteria listed in the proposed code. If a business meets any of the criteria in the proposed code, then that business should be considered a service station. Mayor Giles additionally expressed the same confusion as to what is considered a service station under the proposed code and noted public comments claimed the same confusion as well. The council expressed the need for more clarification on the definition of a service station.

Public Comments

5 written comments were received and are included as Attachment 2.

Lynn Lewinski, 713 Broken Rein

Ms. Lewinski noted attending the Planning and Zoning meetings that addressed the code updates for service stations. Additionally, Ms. Lewinsky noted the future of transportation may be different with electric battery charging stations instead of gas fueling stations.

Lisa Beck, 303 Colorado St

Ms. Beck commented on the possible loopholes the code update for service stations presents and submitted written comments before the meeting.

Wayne Ruemmele, 1008 Bitterroot Dr

Mr. Ruemmele submitted written comments before the meeting and additionally noted support for the code change and further clarification on the definition of a service station.

Mayor Giles noted continued uncertainty with the definition of a service station, but the intent is clear. Attorney Nichols asked Planner Parker if a business came into the city to establish a business like a Shell station on the scenic route, how would that use be considered per code? Planner Parker noted that before a business could be characterized as a service station, staff would have questions to determine what specific items would be sold in the convenience store portion of the business. The business would fall under a service station if auto repair items were sold within the store portion, or it would be a convenience store which has a separate definition in MCC 3.2.02. Attorney Nichols noted there is no convenience store listed in the permitted uses table for a commercial zone. Planner Parker clarified that all uses that do not fall into a listed category in the code or are not listed in the use chart in the code for the zone default to a requirement of a Conditional Use Permit. Additional discussion between Planner Parker and Attorney Nichols

concluded that a convenience store in the commercial zone would require a conditional use permit (CUP) and in the CUP application, the convenience store could propose fuel islands so there is not an outright prohibition on fuel islands with the current proposed definition of a service station.

Mayor Giles asked what would be needed if the Council wanted a prohibition on service stations within the scenic route. Council Member Maciaszek noted service stations with gasoline or diesel fuel islands are prohibited within the scenic route with the proposed code language but there is no prohibition against convenience stores with gasoline fuel islands. The Council discussed the need for clarification on the definition of a service station and if a use is being denied the definition needs to be clear for staff, council, and future applicants.

Council Member Nielsen expressed concern over the fuel islands being labeled for gasoline and diesel only since the future is directed at electric vehicles. The concern is a company coming in with a large number of electric charging stations and no convenience store or service station would be required. Council Member Maciaszek noted the conversation of prohibiting electric charging stations under fuel island brings into question how to regulate hotels and other businesses that offer electric charging stations in their parking lots. The Council discussed electric vehicle charging station scenarios at length.

Attorney Nichols addressed the Council and noted the decision in front of the Council is whether to adopt Ordinance 1015 or not. If large changes are made to the draft ordinance, it would require the Ordinance to be remanded back to the Planning and Zoning Commission. An alternative option is to adopt Ordinance 1015 and have staff bring back additional solutions to address the concerns raised by the Council. Council Member Maciaszek asked for clarification if the ordinance as drafted would prohibit a parcel in the middle of town on the scenic route from being developed with a gas station convenience store. Attorney Nichols noted it would give staff something to use now and further issues and broader concerns can be addressed with an additional code amendment in the future.

Council Member Nielsen noted concern for development being pushed into the less regulated County areas around the City. Council Member Maciaszek noted the community has voiced a preference for large service stations outside of the city and development outside of the City jurisdiction is not up to Council. Council Member Nelson agreed with Council Member Nielsen and suggested clarifying the service station definition with the suggestions from public comment. The Council discussed the impact of where gas station development may occur if a prohibition is put in place within City Limits on the scenic route.

Council Member Thrower moved to close the public hearing for CA-22-03: Amendments to Title III of McCall City Code related to Service Stations within the Scenic Route Overlay Zone. Council Member Nelson seconded the motion. In a roll call vote, Council Member Thrower, Council Member Nelson, Mayor Giles, Council Member Maciaszek, and Council Member Nielsen all voted aye, and the motion carried.

Council Member Thrower noted being in support of adopting the ordinance with a revision to come back to the Council in order to clarify the service station definition. Council Member Nelson noted being in support of adopting the ordinance with the clarification from public comments,

specifically Lisa Beck's comment. Attorney Nichols explained what a "trailer" ordinance is and that the Council can adopt the ordinance as written and have staff bring a follow-up ordinance to Council to add clarification. Council Member Maciaszek supports adopting the current ordinance as written with staff bringing back an additional ordinance for clarification. Council Member Nielsen noted concern that it is still a possibility for someone to apply to open a service station but agrees with adopting the ordinance now with a clarification ordinance later. Mayor Giles agreed with the rest of the Council.

Council Member Maciaszek moved to Suspend the rules and read by title only one time only Ordinance 1015. Council Member Thrower seconded the motion. In a roll call vote, Council Member Maciaszek, Council Member Thrower, Mayor Giles, Council Member Nelson, and Council Member Nielsen all voted aye, and the motion carried.

City Clerk Bessie Jo Wagner read Ordinance 1015 by title only, one time only: AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF MCCALL, VALLEY COUNTY, IDAHO, AMENDING TITLE III CHAPTER 2 DEFINITIONS, TO PROVIDE DEFINITIONS FOR AMENDED AND NEW TERMS: AMENDING TITLE III CHAPTER 3 RESIDENTIAL ZONES AND STANDARDS. MODIFYING PERMITTED, ADMINISTRATIVELY APPROVABLE, CONDITIONAL, AND PROHIBITED USES IN RESIDENTIAL ZONES; AMENDING TITLE III CHAPTER 4 COMMERCIAL ZONES AND STANDARDS, MODIFYING PERMITTED, ADMINISTRATIVELY APPROVABLE, CONDITIONAL, AND PROHIBITED USES IN COMMERCIAL ZONES: AMENDING TITLE III CHAPTER 5 INDUSTRIAL AND BUSINESS PARK ZONES AND **MODIFYING ADMINISTRATIVELY** STANDARDS. PERMITTED, APPROVABLE, CONDITIONAL, AND PROHIBITED USES IN INDUSTRIAL AND BUSINESS PARK ZONES; AMENDING TITLE III CHAPTER 6 CIVIC. AIRPORT AND AGRICULTURAL/FOREST ZONES. MODIFYING PERMITTED, ADMINISTRATIVELY APPROVABLE, CONDITIONAL, AND PROHIBITED USES IN CIVIC, AIRPORT, AND AGRICULTURAL/FOREST ZONES; AMENDING TITLE III CHAPTER 7 SPECIAL DISTRICTS, ADDING A NEW CHAPTER OF PROBITED USES WITHIN SCENIC ROUTE OVERLAY ZONES.

Council Member Maciaszek moved to Adopt Ordinance No.1015 code amendment, CA-22-03, to amend Title III, approve the Summary for publication, and authorize the Mayor to sign all necessary documents. Council Member Nielsen seconded the motion. In a roll call vote, Council Member Maciaszek, Council Member Nielsen, Mayor Giles, Council Member Nelson, and Council Member Thrower all voted aye, and the motion carried.

AB 23-066 Request to Approve Conditional Use Permit CUP-21-03 at 111 North Samson Trail for the McCall Donnelly School District

Council Member Nelson moved to open the public hearing for Conditional Use Permit CUP-21-03 at 111 North Samson Trail for the McCall Donnelly School District. Council Member Maciaszek seconded the motion. In a voice vote, all voted ave, and the motion carried.

City Planner Brian Parker presented to Council. An application for a Conditional Use Permit and Design Review was submitted to expand the existing use by constructing an addition of approximately 12,000 sq. feet of classroom space on the Payette Lakes Middle School, level out

the school campus playing field, and update the traffic circulation between the Middle School and Barbara Morgan Elementary School. During their regularly scheduled February 7, 2023 meeting, the McCall Area Planning and Zoning Commission held a properly noticed public hearing and unanimously recommended approval of the subject application to the McCall City Council without a second public hearing. Public Works Director Nathan Stewart gave a history of the extension of Deinhard Lane. Aron Baker, Horrocks Engineers, explained the traffic study done in the southeast section of town that includes the school. Mayor Giles summarized what has been presented to the Council so far.

Conditions of Approval:

- 1. Prior to the issuance of a building permit, the applicant shall receive final engineering approval.
- 2. Prior to the issuance of a certificate of occupancy, the applicant shall record a 70-foot-wide easement along the entirety of the southern property boundary. The easement shall be dedicated to the public for the construction of a future public roadway, pedestrian pathways and associated snow storage and drainage.
- 3. Prior to the issuance of a building permit, the applicant shall provide a revised bicycle and pedestrian plan showing all bicycle and pedestrian pathways located on-site to be a minimum of ten-feet (10') in width and constructed to the standards identified in the McCall Area Pathways Master Plan, unless the pathways shown are within the 70-foot wide easement required in Condition of Approval #2. The existing substandard pathways may remain until they are required to be reconstructed.
- 4. Prior to the issuance of a building permit, the applicant shall provide a revised site plan identifying a minimum of forty-two (42) long-term and four (4) short-term bicycle parking spaces. The required bicycle parking shall be in conformance with McCall City Code Section 3.8.063(A)-(F) and the Association of Pedestrian and Bicycle Professionals' *Essentials of Bike Parking*.
- 5. Prior to the issuance of a building permit, the applicant shall provide a revised landscape plan utilizing plants from the Native and Suitable Plants List.
- 6. Prior to the issuance of a building permit, the applicant shall provide a revised landscape plan showing at least 10% of the parking lot area replaced with landscaping, or a minimum of 48 native trees (minimum 24 evergreen) and 144 native shrubs to be planted along the western and southern edges of the parking lot to provide screening from Samson Trail.
- 7. The applicant shall construct all necessary internal improvements and implement the modifications to internal circulation proposed within the 2019 traffic impact study, unless the need for specific improvements is negated by the construction of a roadway along the southern property boundary. The initial phase of modifications shall commence prior to the issuance of a certificate of occupancy for the expansion of the Payette Lakes Middle School. Completion of improvements shall be completed in the timeframe proposed within the 2019 traffic impact study.
- 8. Prior to the issuance of a certificate of occupancy, the applicant shall reseed all disturbed areas with native grasses or wildflowers. Sod may be utilized for play areas.
- 9. Pursuant to McCall City Code Section 3.13.034(B), conditional use permit approval shall lapse and become void whenever the applicant has not applied for a building permit within one year from the date of initial approval.

- 10. Pursuant to McCall City Code Section 3.16.08, design review approval shall lapse and become void whenever the applicant has not applied for a building permit within one year from the date of initial approval.
- 11. An expansion of an equivalent square footage to what is shown on the site plan associated with this application may be approved through a design review application and an additional conditional use permit shall not be required. Additional transportation or other improvements may be conditioned within future applications.

Bill Hamlin Design West Architects addressed the Council on behalf of the MDSD. Mr. Hamlin reviewed how the expansion project will help the community and the concerns with some of the conditions of approval that MDSD has. Joe Barton with Paragon Consulting reviewed an additional traffic study conducted in direct relation to the school expansion as well as the capacity of the current school.

MDSD objects to the following Conditions:

2. Prior to the issuance of a certificate of occupancy, the applicant shall record a 70-foot-wide easement along the entirety of the southern property boundary. The easement shall be dedicated to the public for the construction of a future public roadway, pedestrian pathways and associated snow storage and drainage.

MDSD strongly objects to the 70ft wide easement noting it will not be beneficial for access to the school.

3. Prior to the issuance of a building permit, the applicant shall provide a revised bicycle and pedestrian plan showing all bicycle and pedestrian pathways located on-site to be a minimum of ten feet (10') in width and constructed to the standards identified in the McCall Area Pathways Master Plan, unless the pathways shown are within the 70-foot wide easement required in Condition of Approval #2. The existing substandard pathways may remain until they are required to be reconstructed.

MDSD asks that the 10ft width requirement be reduced to 8ft noting that the pathway would be an internal access pathway and not a public trail system pathway.

4. Prior to the issuance of a building permit, the applicant shall be provided with a revised site plan identifying a minimum of forty-two (42) long-term and four (4) short-term bicycle parking spaces. The required bicycle parking shall be in conformance with McCall City Code Section 3.8.063(A)-(F) and the Association of Pedestrian and Bicycle Professionals' Essentials of Bike Parking.

MDSD expressed issues with the covered bike parking and recommendation based on the table in McCall City Code. The main concern is over the weather and ridership numbers citing disparities between the numbers being required and the historical ridership at the school. MDSD suggests a change to the condition to a quarter of what is required in the condition.

6. Prior to the issuance of a building permit, the applicant shall provide a revised landscape plan showing at least 10% of the parking lot area replaced with landscaping, or a minimum of 48 native trees (minimum 24 evergreens) and 144 native shrubs to be planted along the western and southern edges of the parking lot to provide screening from Samson Trail.

MDSD expressed concern regarding the parking lot visual impact mitigation citing a lack of snow storage with the addition of landscaping to provide screening from Samson Trail.

7. The applicant shall construct all necessary internal improvements and implement the modifications to internal circulation proposed within the 2019 traffic impact study unless the need for specific improvements is negated by the construction of a roadway along the southern property boundary. The initial phase of modifications shall commence before issuing a certificate of occupancy for the expansion of the Payette Lakes Middle School. Completion of improvements shall be completed in the timeframe proposed within the 2019 traffic impact study.

MDSD noted that if the traffic study in condition seven (7) is intended to be the 2021 traffic study MDSD has no objection but does object if the traffic study is intended to be the 2019 study. Additionally, if condition two (2) is kept, condition seven (7) makes no sense for MDSD because the requirements would be destroyed with the easement.

9. Pursuant to McCall City Code Section 3.13.034(B), conditional use permit approval shall lapse and become void whenever the applicant has not applied for a building permit within one year from the date of initial approval.

MDSD noted that time is an issue with the addition of a future roadway that may or may not happen because of the impact on the design of the project.

Council Member Maciaszek asked if all of the information being presented to the Council was presented to the Planning and Zoning Commission. Mayor Giles expressed concern over the objections not being expressed in the meeting packet leading to a major disconnect. Mr. Hamlin noted that the Planning and Zoning Commission did hear the objections. Mayor Giles expressed disappointment with the lack of communication and objections ahead of time. Mr. Hamlin noted the Planning and Zoning Commission has made the recommendation to the Council in opposition to the MDSD objections.

Attorney Nichols, Mr. Barton, and Mr. Hamlin discussed the capacity of the school with a consensus that the school is not at capacity currently. Council Member Nielsen asked if there is a plan to address the huge number of parents picking up and dropping off vs. using the bus and hiring more bus drivers. More buses and bus drivers are cheaper than doing the sitework and construction on the school grounds. The Council had an additional discussion on the pickup and drop-off congestion issues.

Mayor Giles asked for process clarification regarding the objections MDSD has expressed. Attorney Nichols noted the Council gets to weigh if the objections are acceptable or not since the Planning and Zoning Commission approval is just a recommendation. Additionally, Attorney Nichols noted the Council must create findings of facts and conclusions of law and decide if there

is enough information for the Council to make a decision. Council Member Nelson asked Attorney Nichols about the original decision for the Fox Ridge development to not devote a 35ft right-of-way easement when the development was built but now MDSD is required to fulfill the easement. Attorney Nichols noted the issue is in proportionality and whether the MDSD application will require additional right of way because of the new development and growth of the school. The proposal is not that MDSD builds the extension of Deinhard Rd, it is a requirement to provide the easement for a future right of way. The Council, Attorney Nichols, and MDSD as well as City Staff had an additional discussion on the condition requiring the right of way easement. Director Stewart provided a history of the right-of-way easement requirement noting that the current easement from the original MDSD Conditional Use Permit approved in 1994, the existing 35ft easement is strictly for utilities and not a right-of-way.

Mayor Giles asked for staff to respond to the objections of MDSD. Director Stewart noted any alternative to MDSD providing an easement has not been researched and would require additional engineering approval. Director Stewart also clarified condition seven (7), noting that the intent of the condition is not to require improvements where the 35ft easement will be located. The proposed pathway system would be a public access pathway and 8ft is not reasonable for a public pathway which is why 10ft is required for the pathway. Planner Parker noted condition nine (9) is in reference to the deadline to apply for a building permit. One (1) year is achievable, but Council can authorize a longer time limit on that condition. Planner Parker also further clarified condition seven (7), noting that the 2019 traffic flow analysis was referred to in condition seven (7). Planner Parker reviewed condition six (6) requirements and authority for landscaping to screen the parking lot from Samson Trail. In the review of conditions three (3) and four (4), Planner Parker noted justification for the bike storage and 10 ft pathway requirement since the site is where most users do not have a driver's license and users should be encouraged to ride bikes to limit the known traffic and queuing problems.

Mayor Giles opened Public Comment at 7:55 p.m.

Four (4) written comments received before the meeting are included as Attachment 3.

Craig Groves, 154 Shadows Trail Donnelly ID

Mr. Groves expressed that City staff and PZ Commission have done an excellent job vetting the application and Mr. Groves is in favor of the recommendation to the Council. Mr. Groves is a property owner to the southeast of the school and noted having tried since July of 2020 to have a meaningful conversation with MDSD but there has not been adequate communication. Additionally, the extension of Deinhard in the future is the right public policy decision based on community growth.

Attorney Nichols suggested a break to give the applicant time to read the written comments provided by the public.

The Council took a break at 8:00 p.m. and returned at 8:14 p.m.

Mayor Giles noted that the written public comments for the hearing have been presented to the applicant and representatives. Mayor Giles opened the floor to the applicant and representatives to comment in rebuttal of any public comments received. Mr. Barton noted that the comments

received verify that the information was adequately presented to the Planning and Zoning Commission.

Council Member Nelson asked City Staff about the easement language comparing the previous CUP and the new application. Planner Parker explained the language used to provide clarification. The council further discussed the easement condition and applicant objection vs. staff and the Planning and Zoning Commission recommendation.

Council Member Nelson moved to close the public hearing for Conditional Use Permit CUP-21-03 at 111 North Samson Trail for the McCall Donnelly School District. Council Member Maciaszek seconded the motion. In a roll call vote, Council Member Nelson, Council Member Maciaszek, Mayor Giles, Council Member Nielsen, and Council Member Thrower all voted aye, and the motion carried.

The Council discussed the evidence of the hearing. The Council consensus was an understanding that the community is in favor of the recommendations from the Planning and Zoning Commission.

Council Member Thrower described the application as being difficult. Public comments note the need for an additional right-of-way because of possible future development behind the school but future development should not influence the application currently in front of the Council.

Mayor Giles asked Attorney Nichols for the legality of all the conditions in the application. Attorney Nichols response was that once the Council decided on the conditions of approval then the Findings of Facts and Conclusions of Law document will be prepared for approval at a future meeting. Mayor Giles complimented the staff and expressed wanting to move forward with the conditions set forth in the recommendation from the Planning and Zoning Commission. Council Member Nelson expressed willingness to bend to the objections of the MDSD on conditions 3, 4, and 6. Council Member Nielsen noted the landscaping and bike parking could have some leeway in the conditions if it makes the easement more agreeable for MDSD but does not want to see any bending on the right-of-way easement. Council Member Thrower noted concerns over the 35ft easement and the proportionality of the easement to the project. The Council discussed the history of the right-of-way easement, the landscaping requirements of the application, and traffic concerns. Council Member Nelson expressed concern over the ability of MDSD and any future developments around the school to work together. Attorney Nichols and Mayor Giles noted the City does not have any impact on the relationship between MDSD and future developers.

Council Member Nielsen moved to approve conditional use permit application CUP-21-03 for the McCall Donnelly School District as recommended by the McCall Area Planning and Zoning Commission and authorize the Mayor to sign all necessary documents. Council Member Maciaszek seconded the motion. In a roll call vote, Council Member Nielsen, Council Member Maciaszek, Mayor Giles, and Council Member Nelson all voted aye, Council Member Thrower voted no, and the motion carried.

AB 23-068 Request to Accept the FY22 Audit Report presented by Josh Tyree, Harris CPA's

City Treasurer Linda Stokes introduced Josh Tyree with Harris CPA to present the annual report for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2022, to Council. Mr. Tyree gave an overview of the fiscal year 2022 audit process and results. Not a forensic audit for fraud but no indication of any fraud, review of revenues and expenditures, capital, or policies.

Mayor Giles expressed compliments to Harris CPAs and Mr. Tyree expressed appreciation for City staff.

Council Member Maciaszek moved to accept the FY22 Audit Report and direct the Treasurer to file the audit with the Legislative Services Office. Council Member Nielsen seconded the motion. In a roll call vote, Council Member Maciaszek, Council Member Nielsen, Mayor Giles, Council Member Nelson, and Council Member Thrower all voted aye, and the motion carried.

AB 23-061 Request Approval of a Construction Contract with Brok Goul Construction for Public Boat Ramp Dock Expansion Project

Parks and Recreations Director Kurt Wolf presented to the Council. The Public Boat Ramp Dock Expansion Project is designed to increase public short-term boat moorage at the public boat ramp to mitigate congestion for launch traffic. This project will give boaters the flexibility to moor their boat while they retrieve boat trailers that often need to be parked and or stored off-site or on private property due to limited boat trailer parking in the immediate vicinity. The dock expansion project will more than double the available space for boat moorage at the ramp and will provide better ADA accessibility while improving safety and the overall boater experience. This project is tied to an ongoing CIP project within the parks department budget. The department has carried \$50,000 in our capital line item to use as a match with grant opportunities. This year the City was awarded \$173,705 from the States Waterways Improvement Fund Grant and \$30,000 as a match contribution from the Valley County Waterways Commission giving the City a total project budget amount of \$253,705. The remaining project fund balance will be used to construct a new pier system adjacent to the volleyball court retaining wall and make grading repairs to sub-subsurface ramp infrastructure in the fall of 2023 once the lake level drops. Both the dock expansion project and the pier construction project went through a formal bidding process. The City received only one responsive bidder for both projects. The proposed contractor has documented and proven work on Payette Lake and adequate recourses to complete the projects in the allotted time frame.

The Council had no questions regarding the public boat ramp construction contract.

Council Member Thrower moved to award a Construction Contract to Brok Goul Construction for the Public Boat Ramp Dock Expansion Project in the amount of \$168,666 pending issuance of applicable 404 Joint Application for Encroachment permits, approve staff to manage change order amounts up to 10% of the contract amount, and authorize the mayor to sign all necessary documents. Council Member Maciaszek seconded the motion. In a roll call vote, Council Member Thrower, Council Member Maciaszek, Mayor Giles, Council Member Nelson and Council Member Nielsen all voted aye, and the motion carried.

AB 23-062 Request Approval of a New Pier Construction Contract with Brok Goul Construction at the Public Boat Ramp

Parks and Recreation Director Kurt Wolf presented to the Council. A new pier was designed to support an additional dock system tied to the public dock expansion project. The new pier will improve ADA accessibility to the ramp docks and increase available space for pedestrian traffic at the ramp. The combined projects will more than double the available space for boat moorage at the ramp and will provide better ADA accessibility while improving safety and the overall boater experience. This project is tied to an ongoing CIP project within the parks department budget. The department has carried \$50,000 in our capital line item to use as a match with grant opportunities. This year the City was awarded \$173,705 from the States Waterways Improvement Fund Grant and \$30,000 as a match contribution from the Valley County Waterways Commission giving the City a total project budget amount of \$253,705. Council Member Maciaszek seconded the motion. In a roll call vote, Council Member Thrower, Council Member Maciaszek, Mayor Giles, Council Member Nelson, and Council Member Nielsen all voted aye, and the motion carried.

AB 23-060 Request to appoint Kelly Hill to the Local Option Tax Commission

City Clerk BessieJo Wagner presented to the Council. The Local Option Tax (LOT) Commission is comprised of two (2) members of different City advisory committees, one senior citizen representative, two (2) representatives from businesses in McCall, and two (2) at large residents of the city. Commission appointments are made for four (4) years from the date of appointment, and until their successors are appointed. The members of the LOT Commission have the responsibility to make specific recommendations for the funding of written requests for the use of the local option non-property tax revenues derived from the lodging taxes. There is currently one (1) vacancy on the LOT Commission for a citizen at large member. A notice ran for four weeks in the Star-News and staff received one letter of interest from Kelly Hill. This appointment will fill the vacancy left by Teresa Grace and will expire in February 2026.

Council Member Nelson asked if Ms. Hill was an advocate for local option tax. Clerk Wagner noted Ms. Hill works for DoneRight Management and brings a different perspective to the process. Ms. Hill is also excited to learn more about the process and to be able to share the knowledge with those affected by the lodging tax.

Council Member Maciaszek moved to Appoint Kelly Hill as the citizen at large representative to the Local Option Tax Commission for a term to expire in February 2026. Council Member Nielsen seconded the motion. In a roll call vote, Council Member Maciaszek, Council Member Nielsen, Mayor Giles, Council Member Nelson, and Council Member Thrower all voted aye, and the motion carried.

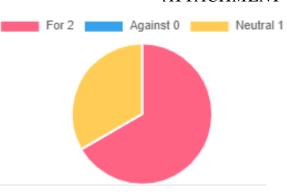

Our small lakefront, live-work-play, town center is not appropriate for this type of business and the associated traffic, noise, pollution, and impacts. 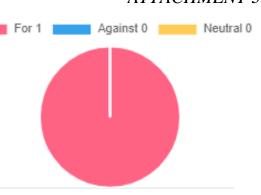

Below are some of my personal observations, if you have any doubt this is the right direction for the long term. I respectfully ask the City Council to support all of the Planning Staff Conditions of Approval. Many thanks to each of you for your service to our community. MY OBSERVATIONS: The current traffic circulation situation at the Elementary and Middle School is inexcusable and poses unnecessary safety issues if there were to be an emergency at any of the events or at peak times. To avoid some of this, I and other neighbors have personally witnessed parents routinely using Woodlands Drive as access to an unofficial student drop-off/pickup point in The Woodlands, through our Community Area on the NE side of MDSD property. It's common on any school day to see a line of traffic backing up on Deinhard nearly to Hwy 55 (my image from Fall, 2022, below), and special events are even worse, with cars lined up on both sides of all area roads: (IMAGE COULD NOT BE SUBMITTED) The extension of Deinhard Lane was envisioned as far back as 1973 when there was an easement on the property for this. MDSD must have known about this when they purchased the property in 1978. Past CUP Conditions of Approval required MDSD to grant an easement for the extension of Deinhard but MDSD has not done so. I've personally read many of these historical documents, reports, minutes, etc, that are recalled in greater detail in the Staff Report, and it's clear to me that over the years MDSD actively avoided ever having a public roadway or easement on the southern part of their property, even though it was clearly required and agreed to by MDSD. At this point in time, it's imperative that this roadway extension opportunity be preserved. Without this extension, and in the event of (likely) development to the East, local residential roads in the area such as Woodlands Drive would not safely carry the resulting dramatic increase in traffic during and post construction. Woodlands Drive is barely a 2-lane road these days. Just this week, Tuesday, a large pickup truck hauling a work trailer in the oncoming lane forced me into a neighbor's driveway and nearly into a snowbank as it drove too fast and West on Woodlands Drive (no image of this). The road always becomes much narrower in winter and sight lines to exit driveways are seriously obscured by the height of snow (my images, March, 2023): (2 IMAGES COULD NOT BE SUBMITTED) There have been total road blockages on Woodlands Drive, the only entry/exit for about 118 homeowners: a fallen tree totally blocked the road (not sure the year) and last fall, 2022, a large delivery truck totally blocked Woodlands Drive (my image below): (IMAGE COULD NOT BE SUBMITTED) At the Feb 7, 2023, P&Z meeting, City Public Works Director Nathan Stewart did an excellent job to explain and answer many questions about how the extension of Deinhard project would proceed going forward after an easement has been granted: he explained generally the financial gains for MDSD due to the City's involvement in the improvements, he gave examples how the design would be in accordance with current safety and design standards and place great emphasis on the safety of students and others, and much more. An extension of Deinhard and traffic circulation improvements can be implemented that will

It's common on any school day to see a line of traffic backing up on Deinhard nearly to Hwy 55 (my image from Fall, 2022, below), and special events are even worse, with cars lined up on both sides of all area roads:



The <u>extension of Deinhard Lane was envisioned as far back as 1973</u> when there was an easement on the property for this. MDSD must have known about this when they purchased the property in 1978. Past CUP Conditions of Approval required MDSD to grant an easement for the extension of Deinhard but MDSD has not done so. I've personally read many of these historical documents, reports, minutes, etc, that are recalled in greater detail in the Staff Report, and it's clear to me that over the years MDSD actively avoided ever having a public roadway or easement on the southern part of their property, even though it was clearly required and agreed to by MDSD.

At this point in time, it's imperative that this roadway extension opportunity be preserved. Without this extension, and in the event of (likely) development to the East, local residential roads in the area such as Woodlands Drive would not safely carry the resulting dramatic increase in traffic during and post construction.

<u>Woodlands Drive is barely a 2-lane road these days</u>. Just this week, Tuesday, a large pickup truck hauling a work trailer in the oncoming lane forced me into a neighbor's driveway and nearly into a snowbank as it drove too fast and West on Woodlands Drive (no image of this). The road always becomes much narrower in winter and sight lines to exit driveways are seriously obscured by the height of snow (my images, March, 2023):

There have been <u>total road blockages on Woodlands Drive</u>, the only entry/exit for about 118 homeowners: a fallen tree totally blocked the road (not sure the year) and last fall, 2022, a large delivery truck totally blocked Woodlands Drive (my image below):



At the Feb 7, 2023, P&Z meeting, <u>City Public Works Director Nathan Stewart did an excellent job to explain</u> and answer many questions about how the extension of Deinhard project would proceed going forward after an easement has been granted: he explained generally the financial gains for MDSD due to the City's involvement in the improvements, he gave examples how the design would be in accordance with current safety and design standards and place great emphasis on the safety of students and others, and much more. An extension of Deinhard and traffic circulation improvements can be implemented that will address student safety.

Education and student safety is important to all of us, not just MDSD, and many students live in The Woodlands. Safety on our Woodlands roadways is safety for students. Students and others of all ages walk, cycle, drive and spend time on our roadways in The Woodlands.

6. AB 23-070 City Licenses Report to Council Per McCall City Code

Per McCall City Code Title 4 Chapter 9, the City Council has determined the City Clerk shall be delegated the authority to process and grant or deny all alcoholic beverage license applications, other than certain circumstances involving catering permits, which the City Clerk shall review the application for catering permit for completeness and forward said application to the Police Chief. The Police Chief upon receipt of the application shall make a recommendation to the City Clerk to approve or deny the application. Whenever the City Clerk shall determine that an application for alcoholic beverage license transfer or renewal is complete, the City Clerk shall approve or deny such application. All decisions of the City Clerk shall be reported to the City Council at the next regularly scheduled City Council meeting after such a decision. The City Clerk is also responsible for all processing of business, taxi, snow removal, pawnbroker, child daycare licenses, vendor and short-term rental permits, and public event applications. *Action: Review the license report*.

7. AB 23-071 Request Approval of a Lease Agreement for Commercial Airport Tenant - Gem Air

Gem Air is a commercial air taxi service that has requested to operate from McCall. They have operated out of McCall Airport for the last five summers. Terms of the lease provide for approximately 1,000 sq. ft. of space in hangar 101 for the period May 15, 2023, through September 30, 2023, leased at \$1,100.00 per month. Gem Air will be responsible for providing additional documentation of vehicle parking spaces subleased from McCall Aviation. They are also seeking to lease a tie-down space for the same period for which they will be charged \$225.00. The lease has been reviewed by legal counsel and meets the airport's minimum standards. Additionally, this lease demonstrates compliance with FAA Grant Assurances for competition and aeronautical use of Hangar 101. Action: Approve the Lease Agreement for Gem Air and authorize the Mayor to sign all necessary documents.

8. AB 23-072 Request to Terminate assumed lease from 2010 and Approve new lease on Hangar 707 for the Sherman Group, LLC

The Sherman Group, LLC, Miller Family Holdings, LLC, assumed a lease on Hangar 707 on Dec. 15, 2010. The original lease was issued to Kris E. Cox on May 1, 2002. The Sherman Group, LLC. was recently made aware that they are in the second year of the first five-year

extension of their assumed lease. Instead of continuing with extensions to the original lease from 2002, the Airport Manager encouraged the lessee to start a new lease with current and approved language. The 2020 Airport Rates and Charges Resolution sets the lease rate at \$.3127 per square foot per annum. The hangar and bare ground total 15,000 square feet. A CPI adjustment will occur retroactively for October 1, 2023, and will be invoiced at the newly calculated rate when annual hangar invoices are issued in November. Representatives of the Sherman Group, LLC have been provided with a copy of the current lease, current Airport Rules and Regulations, and Airport Minimum Standards. The City Clerk will record the document and keep a copy of the City's records. The lessee will pay a \$50 lease termination fee and a \$300 new lease fee per the City's approved fee schedule. The City Attorney has reviewed the new lease. The Airport Advisory Committee has reviewed the request and recommends that the City Council approve The Sherman Group, LLC's lease termination and approve The Sherman Group, LLC's new lease on Hangar 707. Action: Approve The Sherman Group's new lease on Hangar 707 and authorize the Mayor to sign all related documents.

9. AB 23-076 Request Approval of the 2023 Arbor Day Proclamation

Arbor Day is celebrated nationally on the last Friday of April. In the past years, the Parks & Recreation Department has partnered with Franz Witte Nursery to hold the official Arbor Day Celebration on the last Saturday in April. The Parks and Recreation Department plans to recognize Arbor Day Saturday, April 29th with Franz Witte Nursery with the Celebration of Trees Event, a community event. Activities will include educational booths/activities, material covering tree care, planting and selection, and a free handout of tree seedlings. Action: Proclaim April 29, 2023, as Arbor Day, approve submission of the 2023 Arbor Day Proclamation and authorize the Mayor to sign all necessary documents.

Council Member Maciaszek moved to approve the Consent Agenda as submitted. Council Member Thrower seconded the motion. In a roll call vote, Council Member Maciaszek, Council Member Thrower, Council President Nielsen, and Council Member Nelson all voted aye, and the motion carried.

Dr. Harris echoed the concerns of previous public comments concerning Valley County Commissioners' preliminary approval of a conditional use permit for storage units.

Joey Petri, 225 Valley Springs Rd

Mr. Petri expressed support for previous public comments regarding the conditional use permit for a storage unit expansion in the impact area.

Hearing no further comments, Council President Nielsen closed the comment period at 5:48 p.m.

REPORTS

Chamber Report

Chamber of Commerce Director Julie Whitescarver addressed the Council with a review of Chamber business including the upcoming business after-hours, planning the spring membership celebration, and starting the planning process for the 2024 winter carnival as well as the fall festival coming in September 2023.

Council Member Nelson noted the reference of a grant committee in the Chamber of Commerce report. Director Whitescarver gave a review of the Chamber grant committee noting a regional partnership to fund tourism and events in the area. Council Member Nelson noted eligible projects other than community events such as pathways and recreation. Additionally, Council Member Nelson asked if the Chamber has a way of addressing the workforce shortage in the community. Director Whitescarver noted the previous Chamber initiatives for the local workforce and explained how the West Central Mountains Economic Council (WCMEC) has taken on more of the workforce community issues while the Chamber focuses on tourism.

Monthly Department Reports

The Council had no questions for department heads regarding the department reports.

Council Report

The Council had nothing to report.

AB 23-073 Library Board Annual Report to Council

Library Director Meg Lojek introduced Jacki Rubin, Library Board of Trustees Chair, to present the McCall Public Library Board of Trustees annual report to the Council. The Library Board of Trustees advocates for the library and literacy; hires and evaluate the Library Director; monitor the overall effectiveness of the library as a social institution; set library policies and plan strategic goals to better serve the community. Idaho law states the Library Board is made up of five (5) volunteers who are legally responsible for overseeing the operation of the library. Individual members have no legal authority on their own—the board only has authority when it makes a group decision in a meeting that meets the requirements of the Idaho Open Meeting Law. Meetings are held on the 2nd Monday of the month at 10 AM in Legion Hall and on Microsoft Teams as needed. Members are selected by the Library Board and confirmed by the City Council. The mission of the McCall Public Library states: "The McCall Public Library is the anchor for the heart, mind, and spirit of our community. Our mission is to provide boundless opportunities to educate, inspire, and connect patrons of all ages, backgrounds, and views." The highlights of the report included the elimination of late fees, building expansion updates, a review of public art

projects involving the library, and acknowledgments to those helping with the library expansion project.

Council Member Nelson expressed excitement for the community with the programs that the new building will allow the library to offer.

BUSINESS AGENDA

AB 23-077 Idaho Fish and Game (IDFG) Report on McCall Town Deer Issues and the Related Mountain Lion Concerns – Direction to Staff

Police Chief Dallas Palmer, Idaho Fish and Game (IDFG) Regional Wildlife Manager Regan Berkley, and Idaho Fish and Game Regional Conservation Officer Josh Royce presented a report on the "McCall Town Deer" population. Within the report, Manager Berkley provided fact-based data related to the town deer, including population numbers and injury reports. Manager Berkley also addressed current issues related to the town deer population, and current actions being taken by IDFG in response to the town deer issues and associated concerns.

Background:

May of 2021 – The Council directed staff to continue with the preparation of a proposed ordinance that would prohibit the feeding of wildlife.

June 2021 – The Council reviewed and discussed the proposed ordinance. The Council directed staff to bring forward a finalized ordinance for adoption.

July 2021 – The Council adopted the ordinance with a procedural error. The Council addressed procedural error and the ordinance failed to pass upon a follow-up vote. The Council requested staff educate the public on wildlife feeding concerns.

2021, 2022 & 2023 – Keep Us Wild Campaign – Wildlife feeding education to the public through the City website, City social media accounts, Star News, radio ads, Chamber of Commerce magazines, posters, and vacation rental companies.

2023 – Reports of injured deer, malnourished deer, increased deer populations, and mountain lion activities.

Council Member Thrower asked if there is any assessment of what other communities have done and the effectiveness of those programs. Ms. Berkley gave an overview of other communities including the Wood River Valley area. Council Member Thrower asked how the City of Cascade's feeding Ordinance has done. Ms. Berkley noted enforcement in Cascade has been spotty and feeding is still ongoing. Chief Palmer explained how Cascade passed the feeding ordinance and how the enforcement works. Additionally, Chief Palmer suggests a multiple-tier fine and violation schedule if the Council decides to pass a no-feeding ordinance.

Josh Rosye Regional Idaho Fish and Game Supervisor addressed Council to clarify the answer to some public comments received noting that IDFG receives zero tax money for funding and is funded by hunters and fishers. Additionally, Mr. Rosye noted that there is no overnight fix to the issue and shared some education on the mountain lions in town.

Council Member Nielsen asked what the status was in the Wood River Valley currently. Mr. Rosye gave an update on the Wood River Valley's actions and inactions including the euthanasia of three (3) mountain lions in the area because of abnormal behavior. The results of the feeding ordinance being passed have not played out in the area at this time. Council Member Nielsen asked what other communities have had success with feeding ordinances or other measures. Ms. Berkley noted the City of Pocatello is currently manageable. Additionally, the City of Dalton Gardens hired a contractor to lethally remove deer. Council Member Thrower asked what can be expected of the mountain lion behavior as summer approaches. Ms. Berkley reviewed the history of mountain lions in the area, noting that there are usually not many mountain lion calls to IDFG in the summer. Council Member Nielsen allowed a question from the audience.

Rick Mooney commented on the fact that the deer are not feeding on their natural diet in town. David Gallipoli noted the wildlife feeding policy in Yellowstone National Park has worked for decades. Mr. Royse agreed with Mr. Mooney that the deer are not getting the nutritional value needed from the landscaping the deer are eating.

Communications Manager Erin Greaves addressed the Council to review the City's educational efforts after Chief Palmer reviewed past efforts by the City. Council Member Nielsen thanked staff and IDFG for the collaborative effort on education and keeping the education so visible it is hard to miss. Attorney Nichols asked if the known feeders were apparent in the community. Chief Palmer noted that the town feeders are known and additionally noted some feeders have responded to the education but there are still feeders that are not responsive, and people are feeding out of their vehicles.

Council Member Thrower noted that the steps to move forward start with research before spending money on one solution. Council Member Nielsen noted the ordinance proposed previously was in good shape and passing the ordinance is not the issue, it's the emotion tied to actions after an ordinance is passed that is the issue. Council Member Nelson expressed being in favor of spending some City money to do research to provide the Council with recommendations. The study should address human safety, economic impacts, and the health of wildlife. Council consensus included a need for community involvement in the process, the ability to take meaningful action before winter, and continued education.

Council direction to staff included putting together a Town Hall meeting for the public to not only submit a public comment but interact with the Council and staff and to bring back the no-feeding ordinance for review.

AB 23-079 Consideration of a donated structure for Local Housing – Direction to Staff

Community and Economic Development Director Michelle Groenevelt presented to the Council. The City has been contacted about accepting a donation for a single-family A-frame home located at 503 Cross Street for local housing. The Building Official inspected the house to determine the condition of the structure. The building is in good condition and the staff is collaborating with the contractor to better understand the feasibility and cost to relocate the structure. Before spending a lot of time and resources exploring this opportunity, staff wanted to check with the City Council to understand if the Council is interested in staff exploring this donation for a local housing unit.

The preliminary cost of moving and setting up the structure is between \$235,000 and \$275,000. The structure does not require extensive remodeling, but the move is expensive because of the height of the structure.

Council Member Nelson expressed excitement about the donation. Director Groenevelt noted the City is being offered the structure but there are other entities interested in the donation. Council Member Maciaszek noted being an advocate for workforce housing but expressed some concern over some of the costs and the layout of the house. Director Groenevelt noted that staff had the same initial reaction, but the decision is the Council's to make. Council Member Thrower asked for a timeline to get back to the owner with a decision. Director Groenevelt noted that no other projects are slated to occur at the location, but the contractor has been directed to find a home for the structure. Council Member Nelson brought up who the housing would be for and noted other entities that could benefit from workforce housing. Council Member Thrower expressed that using City property for a private entity does not seem right. Director Groenevelt clarified that if the structure goes on City property it will be a City asset, but it could be donated to another entity.

The Council directed staff to pass on the donation, stating that the cost is too high for such an old structure.

AB 23-075 Request Payment Approval from the Local Housing Incentive Program for the Deed Restriction of Lot B6, Running Horse Subdivision

City Planner Brian Parker presented to the Council. The developer of Running Horse Subdivision has deed-restricted Lot B6 through the City of McCall's Local Housing Incentive Program. The deed restriction was approved to be signed by the Mayor on October 6, 2022 (Agenda Bill 22-260). Under the Local Housing Incentive Program established by Resolution 19-02, the grantor of the deed restriction is eligible to receive the \$10,000 incentive for placing the deed restriction on the property.

The Council had no questions or comments regarding the deed restriction payment for the Running Horse subdivision.

Council Member Maciaszek moved to approve payment of \$10,000 per Resolution 19-02 for Lot B6, Running Horse Subdivision, and authorize the Mayor to sign all necessary documents. Council Member Thrower seconded the motion. In a roll call vote Council Member Maciaszek, Council Member Thrower, Council Member Nielsen, and Council Member Nelson all voted aye, and the motion carried.

AB 23-078 Request to Set the FY24 Budget Public Hearing Date and Location

City Treasurer Linda Stokes presented to the Council. Each year, per Idaho Code §63-802A, no later than April 30, the City of McCall must set and notify the County Clerk of the date and location of the budget public hearing. Staff recommends the Council set the FY24 Budget Public Hearing for August 24, 2023, at 5:30 PM in the Legion Hall which is the Council's regularly scheduled meeting location.

The Council had no questions regarding setting the FY24 Budget Public Hearing date and location.

Council Member Nelson moved to set the FY24 Budget Public Hearing on August 24, 2023, at 5:30 PM in the Legion Hall and direct the Treasurer to notify the County Clerk of the

date and location of the FY24 Budget Public Hearing. Council Member Thrower seconded the motion. In a voice vote, all voted aye, and the motion carried.

AB 23-074 Request Appointments to the Airport Advisory Committee (AAC)

Airport Manager Emily Hart presented to the Council. The Airport Advisory Committee is established under Idaho Code Section 50-210, to advise and make recommendations to the McCall City Council on matters about the safety, operation, and maintenance of the McCall Municipal Airport. Mike Weiss' and Rick Fereday's AAC terms have expired. The positions were advertised in the Star-News for two weeks as required by the City Code. Three letters of interest were received: Mr. Weiss' request for reappointment, Mr. Fereday's request for reappointment, and a letter from Andrea Eldridge. The AAC met on Wednesday, April 5, 2023, and makes a unanimous recommendation of re-appointments for Mr. Weiss and Mr. Fereday. Additionally, the AAC appreciated the interest of additional parties joining the AAC and moved to consider amending the AAC Charter to include up to seven members. The AAC will soon submit a Resolution recommending the Council amend the AAC Charter.

Council Member Thrower moved to appoint Mike Weiss and Rick Fereday to the Airport Advisory Committee for three-year terms and authorize the Mayor to sign appropriate documents. Council Member Nelson seconded the motion. In a voice vote, all voted aye, and the motion carried.

Upcoming Meetings Schedule Discussion

The Council discussed upcoming meetings.

Council Member Nielsen commented to Attorney Nichols about the county decisions in the impact area and asked if the City had any options to address the public comments heard regarding community concern over the decisions being made. Attorney Nichols noted the City has no jurisdiction in the Impact Area.

It had obviously been preyed upon. I called Idaho Fish and Game and was told they do not help dispose of deer carcasses and it would be my responsibility to deal with it. I was also told they would not even come out to investigate. I insisted they investigate the kill and someone finally came out later that day but not until I had disposed of the carcass (I did not want it to attract more predators). Their investigation was inconclusive since there were so many deer tracks in the snow. It seems odd to me that Idaho Fish and Game will not deal with game kills within city limits, I would think our taxes pay for such a service. We have lived in McCall for almost 26 years and here are some of my observations. 1. We have always had deer in town but not in the numbers we now have. I used to see 2-5 deer at a time but now I sometimes see up to 16-17 deer in the street by my house. 2. The deer are being fed by some neighbors in the area and even a local brewery puts their spent grain out in a barrel for the deer to eat. Feeding deer should be made illegal in town with a fine imposed if people continue to feed them. 3. Deer populations are so high they are exhibiting different behavior. Populations are so dense that deer began feeding on fir and pine needles in our yard the winter before last. We had to cut down two trees we had been nurturing for years because deer ate so many of the needles. 4. Even though some people are feeding them, many of the young deer cannot compete for food and so become weak and sickly. They either die or are easy prey for predators. Once again, Idaho Fish and Game will not help with removal of the dead deer. 5. The sheer number of deer in town are attracting more predators which may in turn endanger people and pets. 6. I would urge the City of McCall and Idaho Fish and Game to take steps to reduce t

Regarding the "Town Deer": My family owned two year-round cabins here in McCall since the mid 1960's. The first in Wagon Wheel Bay on the West side of the lake for nearly 30 years, and the second in Pilgrim's Cove on the East side of the lake for over 20 years. Deer were always present at the cabins and in and around town all four seasons. It was a big part of what made "getting away from the city to the mountains" so special all those years. The deer have adapted to our mild winters, and stay for the constant food sources in the late fall-into-winter from apple trees around town, lush green lawns, non-native landscaping and trees, beautiful flower and vegetable gardens, ornamental pumpkins and squash on nearly every doorstep, bird and squirrel feeders, etc. A large majority survive just fine even without the residents who choose to feed them. Natural attrition rates claim a percentage every year, as do auto collisions and off leash dogs. During the winter months, the beautifully plowed cart paths on the golf course create a safe 27-hole habitrail system for the deer to easily move around and forage. I witness them nearly daily (for the 12 years I have lived here full time now) from my living room window which is magical to me. The "golf course deer" were here when I moved in. There are generations of mamas that have their fawns in the empty lots next to me and around my subdivision year after year. It is a privilege to witness. As early as 15 to 30 years ago, subdivisions such as Spring Mountain Ranch, Aspen Ridge, The Woodlands, River Ranch, Blackhawk On The River, River's Crossing, Rio Vista, Lick Creek Meadows, etc. didn't exist. The majority of those locations were considered on the outskirts of town, and were heavily forested. The deer had great habitats/homes in those forested acres and were not as readily seen as they are today. With the loss of their natural homes and habitat, they continue to roam those same areas that are now subdivisions, and are considered "town deer". They don't and haven't "migrated" for decades or more. Are there "more" deer than in the past? Maybe. Maybe not. I would love to see data from F & G as well as the forest service from the past 70 years. We have encroached upon their habitat as well as their predator's habitat which brings them closer than ever to town. It is any wonder we have sightings of mountain lions and wolves in the Spring? We have had for as long as I have been recreating and living here....I recall sightings every year of wolves and cougars in and around town even when I was a child. If the deer "understood" boundaries, I suppose all of them would live in Ponderosa State Park and never leave. But with over 600,000 visitors annually, I would imagine it no longer feels like a safe refuge. Learning to live with the deer as well as other wildlife comes with the territory. Do we really expect there to be NO DEER when we choose to live in the mountains of Idaho? How many is "too many"? Do we eradicate them all because we now want our "mountain life" to be like "city life"? I cannot imagine a McCall devoid of deer because some consider them a "nuisance". There is not a day that goes by that I do not see/hear visitors/tourists exclaim with delight each time they see a deer passing by, particularly on the McCall Golf Course. There are hundreds of articles and blogs written about McCall annually with the mention of how magical it is to see the deer in our town. I read just another today. With an intelligent and concerted effort at an educational campaign for locals and visitors/tourists alike (from our City officials/leaders), I believe we can all learn to LIVE with the deer and seasonal mountain lions, NOT eradicate them. "Gonzales says the mountain lion population and density in the area is "estimated to be similar" to what it was last year. She stresses that what's changed is the human awareness of mountain lions, not mountain lion behavior." In Englewood, as well as the state as a whole, not only has the human population increased, Lewis notes, but many of the people moving here come from areas with a much lower wildlife presence, which may also contribute to the increased media attention and excitement that urban wildlife sightings have received." SUMMARY STATEMENT:

Captain Ryan Garber, Fire Prevention / Code Enforcement, McCall Fire & EMS performs the fire inspection of all Short-term Rentals (STR). Captain Garber will present the numbers to date of inspection and of those inspections how many have passed and how many have failed the inspection. He will discuss the primary failure points including windows and egress issues. Amanda Payne, the City's LOT and STR Compliance Administrator, will also be available should the Council have any questions regarding the City's process related to the STR permitting process.

Captain Garber will present three questions for Council to give direction on what to do with rooms that have been used by the owner as a sleeping space but don't meet code:

- 1. Do we require them to remove all sleeping items?
- 2. Can they just lock the door?
- 3. Do they need to make it known in their listing that those spaces are not to be used for sleeping?

- Not having the right items
 - Fire extinguishers not mounted correctly
 - No egress lighting
 - Smoke/Co detectors not interconnected
 - Posted notice not complete. Some are still using the old version. The new one is on the city's website.
- Emergency escape and rescue openings
 - Using a space not originally designed for sleeping
 - Rooms with inadequate escape and rescue openings
 - Sill heights too high
 - Net clear openings too small

Biggest annoyance to homeowners – fire extinguishers mounted in visible locations

Major concerns from a fire safety standpoint:

- 1. Sleeping rooms without egress (Aspen Village Condos, McBride Condos, others)
 - Big expense to homeowner if even possible
- 2. Inadequate detectors
 - a. Expired
 - b. Not interconnected
 - c. No CO or Explosive gas detector (Propane)
 - Easy to remedy, low cost
- 3. Escape openings incorrect size
 - a. Some only require replacing the window with different style
 - b. Some require larger opening or lower sill height.
 - Expensive to remedy

Repercussions of inadequate widow size:

Some owners have already started replacing windows that do not meet escape opening standards

Some will not be used as STRs because of the window issue.

At least one has stated he may have to sell.

12 of 48 is 25%

If there are 500 STRs in McCall City limits, then approximately 125 will have to replace windows to meet the escape opening requirements.

The measurements for egress windows have been the same since 1979. Why are so many not meeting the requirements?

- Homes older than 1979
- Smaller windows were installed in rooms not intended initially for sleeping. Ex an office room.
- Lack of code enforcement?

City Council Awareness

MFPD wants to make sure the Council is aware of the impacts of the emergency escape and rescue opening requirements to owners.

City staff and MFPD are in alignment that the standards for the emergency escape and rescue opening listed in the International Residential Code are the minimum acceptable standards for all sleeping spaces.

What we are doing to address these issues:

- 1. For areas that aren't lockable such as lofts, we will suggest that they remove all beds and means of sleeping and the area must be clearly posted that these area is not to be used for sleeping.
- 2. Rooms that can be isolated must be locked and made unusable if they want to leave the beds. If they remove the beds it should be posted that this is not a sleeping area
- 3. Suggest adding these "not for sleeping" areas to their listing rules which guests would acknowledge when booking.
- 4. Need to adjust listing to reflect the correct number of bedrooms.

Problem:

Owners can potentially just move furniture back into the space.
 Which is why a big part of the focus is education.

SAFETY PRE- INSPECTION CHECK SHEET & INFORMATION

HOW WILL THIS FORM BENEFIT ME?

This document is for the sole use of the business owner/manager/occupant and/or their representative to enhance fire and life safety regarding their property being used as a short-term rental (STR). This pre-inspection check list contains the same 24 items that will be looked at during the Safety inspection. You may use this checklist when performing your own "pre-inspection" prior to Fire District personnel arriving for their annual STR inspection. Going through each item pre-inspection can help save time and reduce interruptions to owners and occupants.

Explanations of many of the inspection items are included. Some items below may not apply to all occupancies. Please take the time to look at each item to ensure compliance prior to your inspection. If you have questions, please schedule a time to talk or call (208) 634-4306 and leave a message for Captain Ryan Garber.

PROPERTY ACCESS

These checklist items are included so Fire and EMS can get to you quickly in the event of an emergency.

- 1. The STR must be numbered in accordance with the city of McCall's Road Naming and Site Addressing Standards.
- 2. Clear Access for emergency vehicles to park within fifty feet (50') of the main entrance to the short-term rental unit shall be provided.
- 3. Access to the main entrance must be free of any obstructions and any steps, stairs, landings, handrails, or guardrails must be in satisfactory condition.
- 4. All egress passages (windows, doors, walkways) must be free from obstructions, including snow, year around.

PROPERTY EGRESS

These checklist items are included so you or your guests can exit the building quickly and easily should there be a fire or other emergency.

- 5. All exit doors must be openable from the inside by a single motion, no key or special knowledge required 6. All egress pathways must have emergency illumination capable of illuminating the path in the event of a power outage from bedrooms to main exit(s). ☐ Lots of questions on egress lighting 7. All sleeping areas must contain an emergency escape and rescue opening installed in accordance with the most recently adopted version of the International Residential Code. ☐ All the sleeping rooms must have windows that are at least 24" high, 20" wide, and have a sill height of no higher than 44" above the floor? ☐ See appendix for additional information ☐ This one will likely be the costliest one for homeowners whose homes don't meet the standard. 8. Sleeping rooms located more than 16 feet above the finished exterior grade must be equipped with an emergency egress ladder. Ladders must be able to be affixed with hooks to a windowsill / retractable and stowed near the inside of the window. A sign on the wall shall indicate where the "emergency ladder" is located. 16 Ft or above escape ladders are required. I recommend if you wouldn't want to jump or have your loved ones jump then have a ladder available.
- 9. Every room intended for sleeping purposes must be equipped with interconnected smoke alarms installed in accordance with IRC section 314. Carbon monoxide detectors and smoke detectors shall be "interconnected" (if one detector gets activated/triggered, all smoke and CO detectors must go off) alarms must be installed in accordance with IRC 315 (in each sleeping room, in hallways near sleeping rooms, and at the top of all stairwells). Smoke and carbon monoxide alarms shall be installed per current code regardless of the age of the structure. Such devices are permitted to be installed in accordance with the exceptions to hardwiring. Interconnection can be achieved by installing wireless or Bluetooth detectors that do not require re-wiring (plug and play).

☐ Many homes need upgrading of their detectors.

HAZARD DETECTION AND PREVENTION

These checklist items are included to prevent hazards or minimize their impact in the event they should occur.

- 10. At least (1) 5lb ABC portable fire extinguisher must be mounted on each floor, in a conspicuous, unobstructed, unobscured location, which shall be hung between four and five feet above the floor and no further than 75 feet to any point on the floor. Extinguishers older than one year old must be serviced and service tagged annually by an approved company.
 - ☐ Many do not want to have an extinguisher in a conspicuous spot.
- 11. Combustible materials must not stored near fuel fired heating equipment, or in special rooms containing fuel fire equipment.
- 12. Proof of cleaning of woodstove and fireplace chimneys within the previous 365 days prior to the fire, health, and safety inspection must be documented.
 - ☐ Owner attestation in writing is sufficient if they've cleaned it themselves.
- 13. A metal ash bucket and lid must be provided near any woodstove or fireplace with explicit instructions that no ash shall be dumped in trashcans or dumpsters.
- 14. Specific instructions must be posted near any wood burning appliance explaining the proper use of the appliance.
 - □ Many owners do not want guests to use their wood burning appliance
- 15. Any exterior recreational fire pit or containment structure must be permanently constructed, or a listed commercial product designed for burning wood or propane, no more than three feet in diameter, clear of any combustible material, and a water supply must be made available for proper extinguishment.
- 16. Roofing on the structure must be Class B or higher fire-retardant roofing.
- 17. All electrical, mechanical, and plumbing systems must be installed and maintained properly and free from any hazards.
- 18. Proof of service to LPG furnace systems by a professional within 365 days prior to the fire, health and safety inspection must be documented. Proof of service to electric

- furnace systems by a professional within the previous three years prior to the fire, health and safety inspection must be documented.
- 19. An approved heat source must be installed that can heat the home to a temperature of 68 degrees at a point 3 feet above the floor. No portable heaters shall be permitted.
- 20. Propane tanks must be kept clear of snow in the winter months for emergencies.
- 21. Propane tank and second stage regulator protection must meet current city standards. A combustible gas detector must be present in any residence where propane is used as a fuel source.
 - ☐ More homes need combustible gas detectors.
- 22. No temporary wiring shall be permitted.
- 23. For all occupancies that have an automatic fire sprinkler system, or a monitored fire alarm system, proof of annual inspection within the previous 365 days must be provided.
- 24. A notice of the following information must be posted in a conspicuous location within the short-term rental unit: (1) the use restrictions (maximum occupancy, number and location of parking spaces, restrictions on parking, solid waste collection, quiet hours and noise restrictions, outdoor activity), (2) emergency exiting plan, (3) instructions for the proper disposal of fireplace or woodstove ash including the prohibition on dumping fireplace ash in trashcans or dumpsters; and the (4) name and phone number of local representative and/or property owner that can be reached on a 24 hour basis in case of emergency and McCall city emergency response phone number (911).
 - Many postings don't have all these required items

EMERGENCY ESCAPE AND RESCUE OPENING

R310.2.1 Minimum opening area.

Emergency escape and rescue openings shall have a net clear opening of not less than 5.7 square feet. The net clear opening dimensions required by this section shall be obtained by the normal operation of the emergency escape and rescue opening from the inside. The net clear height of the opening shall be not less than 24 inches and the net clear width shall be not less than 20 inches.

Exception: Grade floor openings or below-grade openings shall have a net clear opening area of not less than 5 square feet.

R310.2.2 Window sill height.

Where a window is provided as the emergency escape and rescue opening, it shall have a sill height of not more than 44 inches above the floor; where the sill height is below grade, it shall be provided with a window well in accordance with Section R310.2.3.

R310.2.3 Window wells.

The horizontal area of the window well shall be not less than 9 square feet, with a horizontal projection and width of not less than 36 inches. The area of the window well shall allow the emergency escape and rescue opening to be fully opened.

Exception: The ladder or steps required by Section R310.2.3.1 shall be permitted to encroach not more than 6 inches into the required dimensions of the window well.

R310.2.3.1 Ladder and steps.

Window wells with a vertical depth greater than 44 inches shall be equipped with a permanently affixed ladder or steps usable with the window in the fully open position. Ladders or steps required by this section shall not be required to comply with Section R311.7. Ladders or rungs shall have an inside width of not less than 12 inches, shall project not less than 3 inches from the wall and shall be spaced not more than 18 inches on center vertically for the full height of the window well.





EGRESS WINDOW REQUIREMENTS

Per city code for Short-Term Rentals (STR) and the International Residential Code all sleeping areas shall have an *emergency escape and rescue opening* that opens to the exterior of the building. That can be a door that opens to the exterior of the building or an exterior window of sufficient size to permit the occupants to escape a fire and to allow a fully outfitted firefighter to enter. This egress standard has been in place since 1979. This document is intended to help the STR owner/operator understand the egress window requirements.

WHAT IS AN EGRESS WINDOW?

An egress window must meet **ALL** of the four following criteria:

- Minimum net clear opening: 5.7 sq ft. Grade floor or below openings shall be a minimum of 5 sq ft.
- Minimum width of opening: 20 inches
- Minimum height of opening: 24 inches
- Maximum sill height above the floor: 44 inches

HOW IS THE NET CLEAR OPENING DETERMINED?

Take measurements of the width and height when the window is fully opened. It is important to measure from the inside of the window frame. Stated another way, measure the part of the window that is the actual open space (as shown in the pictures below). This open area must be unobstructed, free and clear for a person to exit or fire/rescue personnel to enter. Once the dimension of width (in.) and height (in.) are determined, the net clear opening can then be calculated by multiplying width times height and dividing this total by 144 (1 square foot). See examples below:

Window net clear opening or clearance measurements:

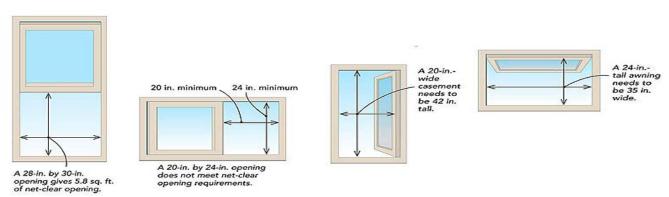
Example 1: Opening width = 28", Opening height = 30" so 28x30=840", divided by 144" = 5.8 sq ft. Assuming the windowsill is less than 44 in. above the floor, this window **would meet** the egress requirements.

Example 2: Opening width = 20", Opening height = 24", so 20x24=480", divided by 144" = 3.3 sq ft. Although this window meets the minimum width and height criteria it does not meet the minimum net clear opening requirements, consequently this window **would not meet** the egress requirements.

Example 3: Opening width = 20", Opening height = 42" so 20x42=840", divided by 144" = 5.8 sq ft. Assuming the windowsill is less than 44 in. above the floor, this window **would meet** the egress requirements.

Example 4: Opening width = 35", Opening height = 24" so 35x24=840", divided by 144" = 5.8 sq ft. Assuming the windowsill is less than 44 in. above the floor, this window **would meet** the egress requirements.

IF MY WINDOW HAS A NET CLEAR OPENING OF 5.7 sq. ft. WILL IT MEET EGRESS REQUIREMENTS?

Only if the window also meets the minimum dimension and sill requirements. For example, a 1 ft wide by 5.7 ft. High window opening is still too narrow to climb through, so it wouldn't pass code.

ARE THERE OTHER REQUIREMENTS?

Yes, the window must be operable from the inside without the use of separate tools, keys, special knowledge or effort. Please contact the McCall Fire Prevention Officer at (208) 634-4306 for questions.

SUMMARY STATEMENT:

Due to cost increases and contractor availability the fireworks display which was previously done by the chamber of commerce has gone from an estimated \$10,000 - \$16,000 to \$15,000 - \$25,000. Staff were able to secure a contractor for the show, however the only way the company can justify a show in McCall on the 4th of July is for it to be a much larger display which comes at a higher cost. The same company can justify a smaller scale show on Saturday, July 01 for a cost of \$15,000, but to schedule a show on July 04 the cost jumps to \$25,000.

To offset the cost increase staff have researched various funding mechanisms which include the following.

- Community Sponsorship Program based on a tiered level sponsorship model
- Partnership program with other agencies such as McCall Fire, Southern Idaho Timber Protection Association, Payette National Forest, Valley County to promote a community show on the lake and a more fire safe community.
- General operating budgets: (surplus auction revenue, marketing line item, parks operating line items.)

RECOMMENDED ACTION:

Review and discuss funding mechanisms with staff with prioritization of funding mechanism to keep project moving forward and secure contractor.

SUMMARY STATEMENT:

The purpose of this agenda bill is to present City Council with draft language that would amend McCall City Code 8.14.8(B) and provide 4th of July alcohol restrictions in a predetermined manner, eliminating the need for the City Council to revisit the restrictions and approve by resolution on an annual basis. The draft language does, however, still provide an opportunity for the City Council to revisit and adjust alcohol restrictions by resolution if the City Council were to determine necessary.

Current Language:

"By resolution, the city council may prohibit the possession and/or consumption of alcoholic beverages in designated city parks on specific days from July 1 through July 7 each year. Signs will be posted in each park announcing the restrictions at least twenty four (24) hours in advance of the beginning of any period of such restrictions."

Proposed Draft Language:

"Unless otherwise set by resolution of the McCall City Council, the possession and/or consumption of alcoholic beverages is prohibited in lakeside city parks from 8:00 p.m. on July 3rd through 8:00 a.m. July 5th each year. Signs will be posted in each park announcing the restrictions at least twenty four (24) hours in advance of the beginning of any period of such restrictions."

RECOMMENDED ACTION:

Approve or amend the proposed draft language of McCall City Code 8.14.8(B) and direct staff to work with the City Attorney to prepare a finalized Ordinance to amend McCall City Code 8.14.8(B) – Alcohol in City Parks on May 11, 2023.

SUMMARY STATEMENT:

The City, in collaboration with Clear Solutions, Inc. has conducted formal bidding for the Davis Beach Intake Station Upgrades – 2023 March. This project provides various building and mechanical replacement/upgrades to meet regulatory requirements, improve performance and efficiency, and enhance aesthetics. Major components include:

- Replacement of the raw water pressure main 12-inch flow meter
- Replacement of antiquated electrical and ventilation components
- Installation of variable frequency drives (VFDs) to improve pump performance, control, and energy efficiency
- New roof, exterior siding and architectural elements to maintain the structure and improve aesthetics
- Epoxy coating of interior concrete flooring, new exterior doors, and exterior pavers at doorway entrances

Attached are select sheets of the design plans. No expansion of the building footprint or pump station capacity will occur with this project. All required design/architectural elements of the project have been submitted to the City Planner to provide Administrative Design Review Approval.

The bid opening occurred on 4/20/23. The bid is being reviewed by the Project Engineer (Eric Landsberg of Clear Solutions Inc) for accuracy and responsiveness to the bidding specifications. - 3.02 The project has been designed by Clear Solutions Engineering, LLC (Project Engineer), which is to act as the OWNER's representative, assume all duties and responsibilities, and have the rights and

authority assigned to "Engineer" in the Contract Documents in connection with the completion of the "Work" in accordance with the Contract Documents and the General Conditions of the Idaho Standards for Public Works Construction (ISPWC).

ARTICLE 4. CONTRACT TIMES/LIMITATIONS

4.01 Substantial Completion

The Contractor shall begin work in conformance with the Contract Documents and shall complete the work prior to the date of completion. The project site will be available to the Contractor for project implementation following Notice to Proceed anticipated by May 18, 2023.

All exterior work including framing, roof, siding, doors, painting, flow meter vault, and pavers shall be complete no later than October 1, 2023.

The work to be performed pursuant to this Contract, shall be substantially complete no later than December 31, 2023.

The project will be considered "Substantially Complete" when all work is complete, tested, and operational.

4.02 Final Completion

The work shall be finally complete and ready for final payment, in accordance with Paragraph 14.07 of the ISPWC General Conditions, within 5 working days of the date of Substantial Completion Certification.

4.03 Working Hours

Work can be performed 5 days a week (Monday through Friday) for a period of 12 hours (7:00 am to 7:00 PM) per day. Adjustment of the contract time can be made in accordance with the provisions of the Contract Documents as directed by the Project Engineer, Public Works Director, or the OWNER.

4.04 Liquidated Damages

A. CONTRACTOR and OWNER recognize that time is of the essence of this Agreement and that OWNER will suffer financial loss if the Work is not completed within the times specified in paragraph 4.02 above, plus any extensions thereof allowed in accordance with Article 12 of the ISPWC Section 100 General Conditions. The parties also recognize the delays, expense, and difficulties involved in proving in a legal preceding the actual loss suffered by OWNER if the Work is not completed on time. Accordingly, instead of requiring any such proof, OWNER and CONTRACTOR agree that as liquidated damages for delay (but not as a penalty), CONTRACTOR shall pay OWNER \$500.00 for each day that expires after the time specified in paragraph 4.02 for Substantial Completion until the Work is substantially complete. After Substantial Completion, if CONTRACTOR shall neglect, refuse, or fail to complete the remaining Work within the Contract Time or any proper extension thereof granted by OWNER, CONTRACTOR shall pay OWNER \$500.00 for each day that expires after the time specified in paragraph 4.02 for completion and readiness for final payment until the Work is completed and ready for final payment.

ARTICLE 5. CONTRACT PRICE

ARTICLE 6 - PAYMENT PROCEDURES

6.01 Submittal and Processing of Payments

A. CONTRACTOR shall submit Applications for Payment in accordance with Article 14 of the General Conditions. Applications for Payment will be processed by ENGINEER as provided in the General Conditions. Contractor shall provide an example Application for Payment submittal to the Project Engineer at the start of the project for review and approval.

6.02 Progress Payments; Retainage

- A. OWNER shall make progress payments on account of the Contract Price on the basis of CONTRACTOR's Applications for Payment on or about the 30th day of each month during performance of the Work as provided in paragraphs 6.02.A.1 and 6.02.A.2 below. All such payments will be measured by the schedule of values established in paragraph 2.07.A of the General Conditions (and in the case of Unit Price Work based on the number of units completed) or, in the event there is no schedule of values, as provided in the General Requirements:
 - Prior to Substantial Completion, progress payments will be made in an amount equal to the percentage
 indicated below but, in each case, less the aggregate of payments previously made and less such
 amounts as ENGINEER may determine or OWNER may withhold, in accordance with paragraph
 14.02 of the General Conditions:
 - a. 95% of Work completed (with the balance being retainage): and
 - b. 95% of cost of materials and equipment not incorporated in the Work (with the balance being retainage).
 - Upon Substantial Completion, Owner shall pay an amount sufficient to increase total payments to Contractor to 95 percent of the Work completed, less such amounts as ENGINEER shall determine in accordance with Paragraph 14.02.B.5.

6.03 Final Payment

A. Upon final completion and acceptance of the Work in accordance with paragraph 14.07 of the General Conditions, OWNER shall pay the remainder of the Contract Price as recommended by ENGINEER as provided in said paragraph 14.07, less any sum Owner is entitled to set off against Engineer's recommendation, including but not limited to liquidated damages.

ARTICLE 7 - INTEREST

7.01 All moneys not paid when due as provided in Article 14 of the General Conditions shall bear interest at the rate of 5% per annum.

ARTICLE 8. INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR

The parties warrant by their signature that no employer-employee relationship is established between the Contractor and the OWNER by the terms of this contract. It is understood by the parties hereto that the Contractor is an independent contractor and as such neither it nor its employees, agents, representatives or subcontractors, if any, are employees of the OWNER for purposes of tax, retirement system, or social security (FICA) withholding.

ARTICLE 9. SCOPE OF SERVICES

The Contractor shall perform all services required by the Contract Documents. All work shall be completed in accordance with the specifications and plans established for this project.

ARTICLE 10. HOLD HARMLESS/INDEMNIFICATION

In addition to other rights granted the OWNER by the Contract Documents, the Contractor shall indemnify and save harmless the Architect and the Owner, its officers and employees, from all suits, actions, or claims of any character brought because of any injuries or damages received or sustained by any person, persons, or property on account of the operations of the Contractor or his subcontractors; or on account of or in consequence of any neglect in safeguarding the work; or through use of unacceptable materials in constructing the work; or because of any act or omission, neglect, or misconduct of the Contractor or his subcontractors; or because of any claims or amounts recovered from any infringements of patent, trademark or copyright; or from any claims or amounts arising or recovered under the Workmen's Compensation Act or any other law, ordinance, order or decree.

ARTICLE 11. CONFLICT OF INTEREST

The Contractor covenants that it presently has no interest and will not acquire any interest, direct or indirect, in the project which would conflict in any manner or degree with the performance of its services hereunder. The Contractor further covenants that, in performing this Contract, it will employ no person who has any such interest. Should any conflict of interest arise during the performance of this Contract, Contractor shall immediately disclose such conflict to the Project Manager, Architect and the OWNER.

ARTICLE 12. ENTIRE AGREEMENT, MODIFICATION AND ASSIGNABILITY

This Contract and the exhibits hereto contain the entire agreement between the parties, and no statements, promises, or inducements made by either party, or agents of either party are valid or binding unless contained herein. This contract may not be enlarged, modified or altered except upon written agreement signed by the parties hereto. The Contractor may not subcontract or assign its rights (including the right to compensation) or duties arising hereunder other than as contemplated by the Contract Documents, without the prior written consent and express authorization of the OWNER.

ARTICLE 13. ADHERENCE TO LAW REQUIRED

All applicable local, state and federal statutes and regulations are hereby made a part of this contract and shall be adhered to at all times. Violation of any of these statutes or regulations by the Contractor shall be deemed material and shall subject the Contractor to termination of this contract for cause. No pleas of misunderstanding or ignorance on the part of the Contractor will in any way serve to modify the provisions of this requirement. The Contractor and his surety shall indemnify and save harmless the OWNER and the City of McCall and its employees, agents and representatives against any claim or liability arising from or based on the violation of any such laws, codes, ordinances, or regulations, whether by himself, his employees, or his subcontractors.

ARTICLE 14. LEGAL FEES

In the event either party incurs legal expenses to enforce the terms and conditions of this contract, the prevailing party is entitled to recover reasonable attorney's fees and other costs and expenses, whether the same are incurred with or without suit.

ARTICLE 15. SPECIAL WARRANTY

The Contractor warrants that nothing of monetary value has been given, promised or implied as remuneration or inducement to enter into this Contract. The Contractor further declares that no improper personal, political or social activities have been used or attempted in an effort to influence the outcome of the competition, discussion, or negotiation leading to the award of this Contract. Any such activity by the Contractor shall make this Contract null and void.

ARTICLE 16. COMMUNICATIONS

Such communications as are required by this contract shall be satisfied by mailing or by personal delivery to the parties at the following address:

V. GENERAL CONDITIONS OF THE CONTRACT

In addition to the general conditions described in this section, this project shall comply with the <u>Standard General Conditions of the Construction Contract</u>, 2017 Idaho Standards for Public Works Construction, <u>Division 100</u>. In case of a discrepancy between ISPWC, the general conditions described in this document shall govern.

GC-1. GENERAL

- All labor, materials, equipment, traffic control, and incidentals necessary for the completion of the work, as
 herein described in these specifications and as shown on the plans, shall be furnished by the Contractor.
 All work performed under this contract shall be completed in strict accordance with this PROJECT
 MANUAL, the project PLANS and where referenced, City of McCall Standard Construction
 Specifications and the Idaho Standards for Public Works Construction (ISPWC). The PROJECT
 MANUAL and the project PLANS have precedence over City and ISPWC standards where there is a
 difference.
- 2. Damage to properties caused by the Contractor shall be repaired and paid for by the Contractor.
- 3. Settlement or premature deterioration of asphalt and base materials that occurs within a year from the date of 'Substantially Complete' shall be repaired at the Contractor's expense.
- 4. Equipment must be operated in such a manner as to minimize the damage to the surface of the existing roadways, driveways and landscaped areas. Track-type backhoes shall be equipped with approved street-use type tracks when necessary.
- 5. Construction items which are not explicitly covered in these written specifications but are required to make a functioning installation shall not be misconstrued by the Contractor as not being a part of the scope of the work covered by the contract. Those items which are not specifically covered in these specifications, but are required by the plans, shall be constructed in accordance with the construction industry's highest standards.
- 6. 'LOCATES' shall be the responsibility of the Contractor.
- 7. Unless otherwise directed, the Contractor shall refer to and comply with the requirements of ISPWC, latest edition.
- 8. Traffic control for all work is the full responsibility of the Contractor and shall adhere strictly to the requirements of the General Condition GC 31, the MUTCD, and as directed by the Project Engineer. One lane of traffic in each direction shall be maintained at all times. The contractor shall notify individual property owners at least 24 hours in advance as to when their driveways will be disrupted for construction activities.
- 9. It is the intent and purpose of these specifications and plans to obtain good workmanship throughout with the completed work complying with said specifications and plans and in full working order upon completion. Work will not be accepted until this result is obtained.
- 10. All debris or rubbish generated by the contractor's operations shall be removed and the areas occupied during such operation shall be left in a neat appearing condition. Any property, public or private, damaged by the contractor shall be repaired to its original condition at the expense of the Contractor.
- 11. Any damage to private property shall be repaired, replaced in kind, or the Owner compensated as required by the Project Documents.
- 12. Upon the satisfactory completion of all work embraced in the contract and specifications, including the cleanup, together with full compliance with the requirements of the General Specifications the Engineer

will, within one hundred-twenty (120) days after such completion and compliance, issue a certificate of completion to the Owner with two (2) copies to the Contractor.

GC-2. COMPLIANCE

The Contractor shall observe and comply with all Federal, State, and Local laws, codes, ordinances, and regulations, including all licensing and permit requirements which, in any manner, apply to the work being performed under this contract. No pleas of misunderstanding or ignorance on the part of the Contractor will in any way serve to modify the provisions of this requirement. The Contractor and his/her surety shall indemnify and save harmless the OWNER or City and its employees, agents and representatives against any claim or liability arising from or based on the violation of any such laws, codes, ordinances, or regulations, whether by himself/herself, his/her employees, or his/her subcontractors.

All work shall be completed in accordance with the specifications and plans established for this project.

GC-4. PLANS AND SPECIFICATIONS AND ADDITIONAL DRAWINGS

- A. The plans for this improvement and the specifications accompanying them shall be considered as a whole, and anything shown or called for in one and omitted in the other is as binding as if called for or shown by both. Figure dimensions shall be in all cases used in preference to scale dimensions. The intention of the documents is to include all labor and materials, equipment and transportation necessary for the proper execution of the work. Materials or work described in words so applied having a well-known technical or trade meaning shall be held to refer to such recognized standards.
- B. The Project Engineer shall furnish to the Contractor the necessary plans and specifications required for the execution of the work at no additional cost. The Project Manager or Engineer shall furnish with reasonable promptness, additional instructions, by means of drawings or otherwise, necessary for the proper execution of the work.
- C. The Contractor shall submit with such promptness as to cause no delay in his/her own work or in that of any other Contractor, copies of all shop drawings and schedules required for the work of various trades as required by the Project Manager or Engineer, and the Project Manager or Engineer shall review them with reasonable promptness, making desired corrections relating to effects on design. The Contractor shall make any corrections required by the Project Manager or Engineer, file with him such corrected copies as the Engineer shall direct, and furnish such other copies as may be needed. The Project Manager or Engineer's approval of such drawings or schedules shall not relieve the Contractor from responsibility for deviation from drawings or specifications, unless he/she has in writing called the Project Manager or Engineer's attention to such deviation at the time of submission, nor shall it relieve him from responsibility for errors of any sort in shop drawings or schedules.
- D. The Contractor shall keep one copy of all project drawings and specifications on site and in good order, available to the Project Manager or Engineer, and their representatives.

GC-5. CONSTRUCTION REQUIREMENTS

- 1. Excavation, including disposal, shall be in accordance with the latest addition of the Idaho Standards for Public Works Construction (ISPWC) and the standards of the of City of McCall.
- 2. Three (3) days prior to construction, Contractor shall contact Dig-Line (800-342-1585) to locate all existing utilities.

3. Mobilization shall consist of preparatory work and operations, including but not limited to, those necessary for the movement of personnel, equipment, supplies and incidentals to the project site; for the establishment of offices, buildings and other facilities necessary for the work on the project; for premiums on bond and insurance for the project; for all other work and operations which must be performed or costs incurred before beginning production work on the various contract items.

GC-6. INSPECTION

Work performed under this contact shall be inspected at various stages of progress. These inspections include, but shall not be limited to the following:

- a. Prior to and during the placement of base materials and all testing of placed materials.
- b. Prior to and during the placement of all plant mix asphalt pavement and all testing of placed materials.
- c. At the completion of the job, after all cleanup, backfilling, site stabilization and all other work is done and job is ready for final acceptance.

It shall be the responsibility of the Contractor to notify the Project Manager when the various phases of the project are ready for inspection.

Request for inspection may be verbal but shall be given in sufficient time to allow the Project Manager to arrange to be present as required. Failure to notify the Project Manager of the inspections shall be sufficient ground to reject the uninspected work and cause it immediate removal.

All discrepancies indicated by the inspector shall be corrected by the Contractor and reinspected before the next phase of operation is started. No claim shall be made for delays caused by correction of work found unacceptable to the inspector.

GC-7. CONSTRUCTION WARRANTY

The Contractor's standard warranty and guarantee period, as described in Section 100 of the ISPWC General Conditions, shall be for 1 year, with the exception of concrete spalling, which shall carry a 2 year warranty. The warranty period shall commence on the date of final project acceptance by the OWNER.

GC-8. ALTERATION OR MODIFICATION OF CONTRACT DOCUMENTS

No alteration or modification of the terms and conditions of the Contract Documents, except by written change order as provided herein, will be binding unless outlined in detail in a separate written addendum, and then only when properly signed and attested by the Contractor, the OWNER, and the Engineer.

GC-9. INVESTIGATION BY BIDDERS

The instructions to bidders cover the general scope of this investigation under the article entitled "Examination of the Plans, Specifications and Site". Bidders are specifically instructed to faithfully examine and investigate all bid prices submitted on their proposals. No bidder may, without the consent of the OWNER or City, withdraw his/her proposal or claim damages or extra compensation by reason of any error or omission made by said bidder in preparing his/her proposal.

GC-10. INTERPRETATION OF THE SPECIFICATIONS

A. In the event the specifications and plans are deficient or not clearly expressed, the parties submitting proposals hereunder must apply to the Project Manager or Engineer for the required information or explanation before the bids are submitted.

B. The request for such explanation or interpretation shall be made in writing and the person submitting the request will be responsible for its prompt delivery. Such interpretation or explanation will be given by the Engineer in writing and a copy will be filed in the office of the City Clerk. The OWNER or the City will not be responsible for any other explanation or interpretation of the plans and specifications. After submission of bids, no bidder shall claim any misunderstanding in or to the nature of the amount of work to be performed or attempt to hold the OWNER or City or any person responsible for any error or omission that may have been made by the bidder.

GC-11. CONTRACTS

A. Contract Form

1. A copy of the construction contract form is included in these documents.

B. Execution of Contract

- 1. Within seven (7) days after receiving properly prepared Contract Documents from the OWNER, the successful bidder shall sign and return the contract to the OWNER. Work shall be started upon written notice to proceed from the Project Manager.
- 2. The Contractor agrees that he/she is as fully responsible to the OWNER and the City for the acts and omissions of his/her subcontractors and of persons either directly or indirectly employed by them, as he/she is for the acts and omissions of persons directly employed by him, and that the Contractor shall hold the OWNER and the City harmless for any activities of such subcontractors and shall indemnify and defend the OWNER and the City from damages and claims of whatever nature relating or resulting to the activities of such subcontractors.

C. Subcontracts

- <u>Subcontractors</u>, <u>Equipment and Material</u>: The successful bidder, in addition to listing the names and addresses of subcontractors in his/her bid, shall, within seven (7) days after award of the contract, notify the Engineer in writing of the names of all major equipment and material suppliers proposed for the principal parts of the work, and for such others as the Engineer may direct, and shall not employ any subcontractors, (or purchase any equipment), to which the Engineer, OWNER or the City may within a reasonable time object to as incompetent or undesirable.
- Relations of Contractor and Subcontractor: The Contractor agrees to bind every subcontractor and every subcontractor agrees to be bound by the terms of the construction contract, the information to bidders, the general conditions, the plans, and the specifications as far as applicable to his/her work, including the following provisions of this article, unless specifically noted to the contrary in a subcontract approved in writing as adequate by the OWNER through its Engineer. Nothing in this section shall create any obligation on the part of the OWNER to pay to or to see to the payment of any sums to any subcontractor.

a. The Subcontractor shall agree:

(1) To be bound to the Contractor by the terms of the Contract Documents, and to assume toward him all the obligations and responsibilities that he, by those documents, assumes toward the owner. Nothing contained in the Contract Documents shall create any contractual relation between any subcontractor and the OWNER.

- (2) To submit to the Contractor applications for payment in such reasonable time as to enable the Contractor to apply for payment. The Project Manager or Engineer shall, on request, furnish to any subcontractor, wherever practical, evidence of the amounts certified on his/her account.
- (3) To make all claims for extras, for extension of time and for damages for delays or otherwise, to the Contractor in the manner provided in the general conditions for like claims by the Contractor upon the owner, except that the time for making claims for extra cost is one week from the date such claim arises.

b. The Contractor agrees:

- (1) To be bound to the subcontractor by all the obligations that the OWNER or City assumes to the Contractor under the Contract Documents.
- (2) To pay the subcontractor for conforming work, upon the payment of certificates, if issued under the terms of payments for the work, the amount allowed to the Contractor on account of the subcontractor's work to the extent of the subcontractor's interest therein.
- (3) To pay the subcontractor for conforming work, upon the payment of certificates, if issued otherwise than as in (2) so that at all times his/her total payments shall be as large in proportion to the value of the work done by him as the total amount certified to the Contractor is to the value of the work done by him.
- (4) To pay the subcontractor for conforming work to such extent as may be provided by the Contract Documents or the subcontract if either of these provides for earlier or larger payments than the above.
- (5) To pay the subcontractor for conforming work on demand on his/her work or materials as far as executed and fixed in place, less retained percentage, at the time the certificate should be issued, even though the Engineer fails to issue it for any cause not the fault of the subcontractor.
- (6) To make no demands for liquidated damages or penalty for delay in any sum in excess of such amount as may be specifically named in the subcontract.
- (7) That no claim for services rendered or material furnished by the Contractor to the subcontractor shall be valid unless written notice thereof is given by the Contractor to the subcontractor during the first ten (10) days of the calendar month following that in which the claim originated.
- (8) To give the subcontractor an opportunity to be present and to submit evidence in any hearing involving his/her rights.
- (9) To pay each subcontractor for satisfactory performance of its contract no later than 20 calendar days from receipt of each payment the Contractor receives from the OWNER or City. The Contractor shall return retainage to each Subcontractor within 20 calendar days after the Subcontractor's work is satisfactorily completed.
- (10) To certify with each estimate payment to Subcontractors has been made within the prescribed time frames. The certification will be made on forms provided by

the OWNER or City, and returned within 20 calendar days of receiving the estimate payment.

- D. OWNER or City's Right to Terminate Contract If the Contractor:
 - 1. Fails to begin work under the contract within the time specified in the "Notice to Proceed"; or
 - 2. Fails to supply sufficient skilled personnel or suitable materials or equipment to complete the work within the time limits specified; or
 - 3. Performs the work unsuitably or neglects or refuses to remove materials or to re-perform such work which is not in accordance with the plans and specifications; or
 - 4. Discontinues the prosecution of the work for more than ten (10) days; or
 - 5. Fails to resume work which has been discontinued within a reasonable time after notice to do so; or
 - 6. Fails to make prompt payments to subcontractors or for labor, materials, or equipment; or
 - 7. Disregards laws, ordinances, or the instruction of the Engineer; or
 - 8. Becomes insolvent or is declared bankrupt, or commits any act of bankruptcy or insolvency; or
 - 9. Makes an assignment for the benefit of creditors; or
 - 10. Is guilty of a substantial violation of any provisions of the contract; in any such event(s), the OWNER or City, upon recommendation of the Project Manager or Engineer that sufficient cause exists to justify such action may, without prejudice to any other right or remedy, give notice to the Contractor and his/her surety of such delay, neglect, or default. If the Contractor or his/her surety, within a period of ten (10) days after such notice, does not proceed in accordance therewith, then the OWNER or City shall have full power and authority, without violating the contract, to take the prosecution of the work from the Contractor. The OWNER or City may appropriate or use any or all materials and equipment on the grounds as may be suitable and acceptable and may enter into an agreement for the completion of said contract according to the terms and provisions thereof, or use such other methods as may be required for the completion of the contract in an acceptable manner.

Costs and charges incurred by the OWNER or City, together with the cost of completing the work under the contract, will be deducted from any moneys due or which may become due the Contractor. If such expense exceeds the sum which would have been payable under the contract, then the Contractor and its surety shall be liable and shall pay to the OWNER or City the amount of such excess.

- E. Contractor's Right to Stop Work or Terminate Contract: If the work should be stopped pursuant to lawful order of a court of competent jurisdiction, or pursuant to lawful order of other public authority having jurisdiction, for a period of three months, through no act or fault of the Contractor or of anyone employed by him, or if the Engineer should fail to issue any certificate for payment within thirty (30) days after it is due, or if the OWNER or City should fail to pay to the Contractor within thirty (30) days of its maturity and presentation, any sum certified by the Engineer or awarded by the court, then the Contractor may, upon twenty-two (22) days notice to the OWNER or City and Engineer, stop work or terminate this contract or recover from the OWNER or City payment for all work executed and any loss sustained upon any plant or materials and reasonable profit and damages.
- F. Assignment: The Contractor shall not assign this contract or sublet or subcontract any portion of it without the prior written consent of the OWNER or City nor shall the Contractor assign any moneys due or to become due to him hereunder, without the prior written consent of the OWNER or City. Any such assignment or sublet without such prior written consent shall be null and void and shall be a ground for termination for cause of this contract by the OWNER or City.

GC-12. AUTHORITY OF THE ENGINEER AND SUSPENSION OF WORK

If the performance of all or any portion of the work is suspended or delayed by the Engineer or Project Manager for an unreasonable period of time (not originally anticipated, customary, or inherent to the construction industry) and the Contractor believes that additional compensation and/or contract time is due as a result of such suspension or delay, the Contractor shall submit to the Project Manager or Engineer in writing a request for adjustment within seven calendar days of receipt of the notice to resume work. The request shall set forth the reasons and support for such adjustment.

Upon receipt, the Project Manager or Engineer will evaluate the Contractor's request. If the Project Manager or Engineer agrees that the cost and/or time required for the performance of the contract has increased as a result of such suspension and the suspension was caused by conditions beyond the control of and not the fault of the Contractor, its suppliers, or subcontractors at any approved tier, and not caused by weather, the Engineer will make adjustment as provided (excluding profit) and modify the contract in writing accordingly. The Engineer will notify the Contractor of the determination whether or not an adjustment of the contract is warranted.

No contract adjustment will be allowed unless the Contractor has submitted the request for adjustment within the time prescribed.

No contract adjustment will be allowed under this clause to the extent that performance would have been suspended or delayed by any other cause, or for which an adjustment is provided for or excluded under any other term or condition of this contract.

GC-13. CHANGES AND EXTRA WORK

The Engineer reserves the right to make, at any time during the work, such changes in quantities and such alterations in the work as are necessary to satisfactorily complete the project. Such changes in quantities and alterations shall not invalidate the contract nor release the surety, and the Contractor agrees to perform the work as altered.

If the alterations or changes in quantities significantly change the character of the work under the contract, whether or not changed by any such different quantities or alterations, an adjustment, excluding loss of anticipated profits, will be made to the contract. The basis for the adjustment shall be agreed upon prior to the performance of the work. If a basis cannot be agreed upon, then an adjustment will be made either for or against the Contractor in such amount as the Engineer may determine to be fair and equitable.

If the alteration or changes in quantities do not significantly change the character of the work to be performed under the contract, the altered work will be paid for as provided elsewhere in the contract.

The term "significant changes" shall be construed to apply only to the following circumstances:

a. When the character of the work as altered differs materially in kind or nature from that involved or included in the original proposed construction; or

b. When a major item of work, as defined elsewhere in the contract, is increased in excess of 125 percent or decreased below 75 percent of the original contract quantity. Any allowance for an increase in quantity shall apply only to that portion in excess of 125 percent of original contract item quantity, or in case of a decrease below 75 percent, to the actual amount of work performed.

GC-14. DIFFERING SITE CONDITIONS

During the progress of the work, if subsurface or latent physical conditions are encountered at the site differing materially from those indicated in the contract or if unknown physical conditions of an unusual nature, differing materially from those ordinarily encountered and generally recognized as inherent in the work provided for in the contract, are encountered at the site, the party discovering such conditions shall promptly notify the other party in writing of the specific differing conditions before they are disturbed and before the affected work is performed.

Upon written notification, the Project Manager or Engineer will investigate the conditions, and if it is determined that the conditions materially differ and cause an increase or decrease in the cost or time required for the performance of any work under the contract, an adjustment, excluding loss of anticipated profits, will be made and the contract modified in writing accordingly. The Project Manager or Engineer will notify the Contractor of the determination whether or not an adjustment of the contract is warranted.

No contract adjustment which results in a benefit to the Contractor will be allowed unless the Contractor has provided the required written notice.

GC-15. MEASUREMENT AND PAYMENTS

- A. The PAYMENT for all work described by the Plans and Specifications to construct this project shall be the unit price and lump sum amounts given in the Contractor's proposal / bid schedule, which price and payment includes all labor, materials, equipment, bonds, warranties, taxes, insurances, mobilization, cleanup, traffic control, permits, tests, shop drawings, submittal, freight, and incidental costs necessary to construct the improvements shown on the Plans and described in the Specifications and Contract Documents.
 - Individual pay items and units of measurement for payment are set forth in the Bid Schedule and Technical Specifications.
- B. The Contractor shall file monthly requests for payment with the Project Manager for all work completed on the Project for each month, respectively. Payments will be made by the "OWNER" for all work verified by the Engineer and approved by the OWNER and City Council via the Finance Department's warrant register.
- C. The OWNER or City may, but is not obligated to, withhold any payments to the Contractor, in addition to retained percentage, in such an amount or amounts as may be necessary to cover:
 - 1. Payments that may be earned or due for just claims or labor or materials furnished in and about the work;
 - 2. Defective and/or condemned and/or non-conforming work or materials not remedied;
 - 3. Failure of the Contractor to make proper payments to a subcontractor;
 - 4. Reasonable doubt that this contract can be completed for the balance then unpaid;
 - 5. Damages to another Contractor where there is evidence thereof;
 - 6. Payments that cover all taxes, excises and license fees due the State and its taxing entities whether or not these monies are yet due and payable.

The OWNER or City shall have the right, but not the obligation, to disperse and shall have the right to act as agent for the Contractor for the limited purpose of dispersing such funds as have been withheld pursuant to this paragraph to the party or parties who are entitled to payment there from. In the event the OWNER or City elects to disperse such funds, the OWNER or City shall render to the Contractor a proper accounting of all such funds dispersed on behalf of the Contractor. Nothing herein shall create in such party or parties entitled to payment a cause of action against the OWNER or City for failure to exercise its rights pursuant to this section. Contractor further agrees that no cause of action shall accrue on behalf of the Contractor as a result of the OWNER or City's exercise of such right to disperse.

These requirements shall also apply to first or lower tier subcontractors.

GC-16. ABANDONMENT OF WORK

If the Contractor abandons the work for a period of fourteen (14) days for any cause other than failure of the OWNER to make monthly payments, or refuses to comply with the provisions of the plans and specifications, the OWNER

shall have the right to notify the Contractor's surety and require said surety to complete the work in accordance with the aforesaid plans and specifications. In the event no liens or claims have been filed and the OWNER fails to make progress payments, the Contractor may then, at his/her option, cease operations until payments are resumed by notifying the OWNER of his/her intention to cease operations for this cause. Should the Contractor abandon the work, fail or refuse to complete the work embraced in this contract, or fail to pay just claims for labor and materials, the OWNER reserves the right to charge against the Contractor, and Contractor agrees to pay, all legal, engineering, or other costs caused by such abandonment, failure or refusal. The Contractor agrees that such legal costs shall also include the OWNER's costs of defending any suits in connection with such abandonment, failure or refusal and nonpayment of claims wherein the OWNER is made a co-defendant.

GC-17. AUTHORITY OF PROJECT MANAGER AND ENGINEER

- A. The Project Manager or Engineer shall decide questions which may arise as to the quality and acceptability of materials furnished and work performed, and as to the manner of performance and rate of progress of the work; questions which may arise as to the interpretation of the plans and specifications; and questions as to the satisfactory and acceptable fulfillment of the terms of the contract.
- B. The Project Manager or Engineer, including his/her employees and agents shall at all times have access to the work wherever it is in preparation or progress and the Contractor shall provide proper facilities for such access and for inspection. Inspections by the Project Manager or Engineer shall be promptly made. If any work should be covered up without approval or consent of the Engineer, it shall be uncovered, if required by the Engineer, for examination. The costs associated with the uncovering of such non-approved work shall be the responsibility of Contractor and shall not be charged to the OWNER or City.
- C. Reexamination of questioned work may be ordered by the Project Manager or Engineer and if so ordered the work must be uncovered by the Contractor. If such work be found in accordance with the plans and specifications, the OWNER or City shall pay the cost of the reexamination and replacement. If such work is found not in accordance with the plans and specifications, the Contractor shall pay such costs.

GC-18. PERFORMANCE AND PAYMENT BONDS

The Contractor shall execute a separate performance bond and payment bond, each in penal amounts at least equal to 100% of the of the full contract price, such bonds to be executed by a corporate bonding company (surety) licensed to do business in the State of Idaho and which is acceptable to the OWNER or City. Such corporate bonding company (surety) shall be required to be named on the current list of "Surety Companies Acceptable on Federal Bonds" as published in the Treasury Department Circular Number 570. The premiums of such bonds shall be paid by Contractor. The performance bond shall be conditioned upon the Contractor's faithful performance of all the covenants and agreements on the part of the Contractor to be kept and performed at the times and in the manner set forth in the agreement, including the repair or replacement where required, or the cost of repair or replacement, of all work performed under the terms of this agreement. The payment bond shall be conditioned upon the payment to all persons, including subcontractors, who have, and fulfill, contracts for performing labor and furnishing materials in the prosecution of the work provided for in such contract, provided that every such payment bond shall be construed, regardless of its language, as incorporating within its provisions the obligation to pay those persons who furnish labor or materials as stated in the Contract Documents.

Such bonds shall remain in full force and effect during the term of this agreement and during the terms of any warranty required by the specifications and shall be held in the custody of the OWNER or City. The current power of attorney for the persons who sign for the surety company shall be attached to the bond. The power of attorney shall be sealed and certified with a "first hand signature" by an officer of the surety. A facsimile signature shall not be acceptable to the OWNER or City.

If, at any time, a surety on any such bond is declared as bankrupt or loses its right to do business in the state of Idaho or is removed from the list of surety companies accepted on Federal bonds, the Contractor shall, within ten (10) days

after notice from the OWNER or City to do so, substitute an acceptable bond (or bonds) in such form and sum signed by such other surety or sureties as may be satisfactory to the OWNER or City. The expense of such replacement bonds shall be borne by the Contractor. No further payments by the OWNER or City pursuant to this contract shall be deemed due nor shall be made until the new surety or sureties shall have furnished an acceptable bond to the OWNER or City.

GC-19. INSURANCE/CITY TO BE NAMED AS ADDITIONAL INSURED

The Contractor shall not commence work until he/she has obtained all insurance required under this section or until he/she has satisfied the OWNER or City in this respect; nor shall he/she allow any subcontractor to commence work until such subcontractor has also obtained such required insurance applicable to such subcontractor's work. The Contractor shall maintain such required insurance coverage throughout the term of this contract as will hold the OWNER or City harmless and shall indemnify the OWNER or City for any losses arising out of the Contractor's operations, including any contingent liability arising there from. The cost of such insurance shall be borne by the Contractor. The Contractor shall furnish copies of all insurance policies and/or certificates of insurance to the OWNER or City at the time of execution of this agreement. Each policy shall include a provision to the effect that it shall not be subject to cancellation, or reduction in the amounts of its liabilities, or any other material change, until notice has been given in writing to the OWNER or City and the Engineer not less than fifteen (15) days prior to such action. Contractor shall further cause the OWNER or City to be named as an additional insured on all applicable insurance policies.

- A. The Contractor shall take out and maintain during the term of this contract, statutory worker's compensation insurance for all employees who will work on this project, and if any work is subcontracted, the Contractor shall require the subcontractor similarly to provide such insurance for all of the latter's employees unless they are included under the protection afforded by the Contractor.
- B. The Contractor shall take out and maintain during the term of this contract comprehensive public and general liability insurance in accordance with the Project Specifications and Section 100 General Conditions of the ISPWC
- C. The Contractor shall take out and maintain during the term of this contract builders risk insurance which shall be written in completed value form, shall protect the Contractor and the OWNER or City against 'all risks' of direct physical loss to buildings, structures, equipment and materials to be used in providing, performing or completing the project. This insurance shall be written with limits not less than the insurable value of the project at completion. This insurance shall include coverage while equipment or materials are in warehouses, during installation, during testing, and after the project is completed, but prior to final payment.
- D. Contractor's Responsibility for Materials. The Contractor shall be responsible for all materials and work performed until final acceptance by the OWNER or the City.
- E. Contractor shall require all subcontractors to maintain the above referenced insurance requirements and shall verify that such requirements have been met by requiring all subcontractors to provide certification therefore.

GC-20. PATENT ROYALTIES AND PROCESS FEES

The Contractor shall furnish the OWNER or City a license or licenses for the use of any process or processes in connection with this project. The Contractor shall include in the unit price bid any patent royalties or license fees for equipment installed or construction methods used.

GC-21. CONTRACTOR RESPONSIBLE FOR WORK

The Contractor shall be responsible for all work until its acceptance by the owner.

GC-22. USE OF COMPLETED PORTION

The OWNER or City reserves the right to use and occupy any portion of the improvement which has been completed sufficiently to permit use and/or occupancy, and such use and/or occupancy shall not be construed as an acceptance of the work as a whole or any part thereof. Any claims which the OWNER or City may have against the Contractor shall not be deemed to have been waived by such use and/or occupancy.

GC-23. SIGNATURES

A proposal made by a corporation shall be signed and sealed by the legally authorized officers of said corporation. If awarded the contract, the contract shall also be executed by proper authorized officers and be affixed with the corporate seal. If a proposal or contract is signed by an agent, such agent shall furnish satisfactory written evidence of the agent's authority to sign as the legal representative of the bidder. An authorized partner of a co-partnership may sign the contract subject to the approval of the Attorney, who may, at his/her discretion, require each and every member of the co-partnership to sign the contract.

GC-24. ORDERS TO BEGIN WORK

The successful bidder shall not begin work until after the contract has been executed and the surety bond and insurance has been approved by the Attorney. The order for the Contractor to begin work shall be issued by the Engineer by a written "Notice to Proceed".

GC-25. ORDER OF WORK

- A. The contract period and time of completion will be as set forth Article 4 of the Agreement.
- B. The specific details of the order of work will be worked out in conjunction with the Project Manager or Engineer before construction begins. Before the successful bidder is authorized to begin work, he/she shall attend a pre-construction conference with the Project Manager or Engineer. At this time the successful bidder shall present a written schedule, for the entire project, specifying the beginning and completion dates for each phase of work. Once approved by the Project Manager or Engineer, this schedule shall be adhered to by the Contractor and he/she shall employ the necessary work force and equipment to maintain such schedule. Contractor further agrees that the approval by the Project Manager or Engineer of such schedule shall not create any liability for the Project Manager or Engineer or the OWNER or City for Contractor's means, methods, sequences, techniques or site safety.

GC-26. EFFICIENCY OF OPERATION/LICENSING

The work embraced in this project shall be started at the earliest possible date after signing the contract, and shall be prosecuted regularly and without interruption thereafter, unless otherwise directed by the Engineer. The Contractor shall furnish work force and equipment sufficient to accomplish full completion of the work within the time specified in the proposal and contract. The Contractor shall at all times employ efficient and experienced workers. Contractor shall also require and verify that all workers and subcontractors are licensed in accordance with law and/or regulation.

GC-27. PROTECTION OF WORK AND PROPERTY

- A. The Contractor shall exercise particular care in protecting surrounding buildings, trees, and property from injury during the demolition and construction operation, and shall be responsible for their protection and shall repair or compensate the owner thereof for any damage which may result from such demolition and construction operations. The expense of such compensation or repair shall be borne by Contractor, and shall not be the responsibility of the OWNER or City.
- B. The Contractor shall exercise particular care in protecting trees, located on private or public property, from injury during the demolition and construction operations. If the Contractor's duties under this agreement shall cause any damage, mutilation, or destruction whatsoever, of any public tree, due to Contractor's need

to remove, top, excavate, fill, or compact the roots of such public tree, or by the placement or storage of any materials which are hazardous to trees, near such public tree, the Contractor shall:

- 1. Inform the City Arborist of such need
- 2. Plot the location of such tree on the site plan which is the subject of this agreement; and
- 3. Comply with all permit requirements as set forth in Ordinance 853, __8-17-09 City Code §5-8-1 et seq.
- C. Any utilities damaged by the Contractor shall be repaired by the Contractor and the Contractor shall be responsible to maintain temporary service until such damage is repaired. The expense of such repair and/or temporary service shall be borne by Contractor, and shall not be the responsibility of the OWNER or City.
- D. The Contractor shall provide and maintain temporary sidewalks, warning lights, barricades and other preventive means to safeguard pedestrian and vehicular traffic around the construction in accordance with GC-29 and GC-30, the Project Documents, and as deemed necessary by the Engineer and at no expense to the OWNER or City.
- E. During all construction operations, the Contractor shall construct and maintain such facilities as may be required to provide access by all property owners to their property. No person shall be cut off from access to his/her residence or place of business unless the Contractor has made a special arrangement with the affected persons.
- F. Construction operations and parking of vehicles shall be confined to areas designated by the Engineer. Contractor shall consult the proper traffic regulatory authorities regarding the routing of trucks and other vehicles, and shall follow the direction of such authorities.

GC-28. RESPONSIBILITY FOR SAFETY

The Contractor shall be responsible for the safety of his/her work, equipment, and materials until the finished project is accepted by the OWNER or City.

GC-29. GUARDS AND BARRICADES

The Contractor shall erect and maintain such barricades, detour signs and warning lights as will effectively mark any hazards or detours and the Contractor shall be liable for any damage occasioned by his/her acts or negligence, or the acts or negligence of his/her employees, agents or subcontractors, and shall indemnify the OWNER or City and the Engineer against loss and/or liability for any such damage, acts or negligence. Traffic signs shall be in accordance with the standards presented in the most current edition of the "Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices" and as specified in TS-2.

GC-30. EXISTING TRAFFIC SIGNS AND FACILITIES

Existing traffic and street name signs which will interfere with construction shall be removed by the Contractor and stored in a safe place. These signs shall not be removed until the Contractor has obtained the consent of the traffic regulatory authorities having jurisdiction and until the necessary measures have been taken to safeguard traffic after the signs have been removed. Preservation and maintenance of the signs shall be the sole responsibility of the Contractor. As soon as sign location no longer interferes with work, the Contractor shall reset all such signs at locations indicated by the traffic regulatory authorities having jurisdiction, in cooperation with the Engineer. All costs incurred in work outlined above shall be considered as incidental to the construction contract, and shall be borne by Contractor.

GC-31. MAINTAINING POSTAL SERVICE

Postal service shall be maintained in accordance with instructions of the U.S. Postal Service. All costs incurred in work outlined above shall be considered as incidental to the construction contract, and shall be borne by Contractor.

GC-32. EMERGENCY WORK

The Contractor will not be allowed added compensation for any emergency work performed on Sundays or legal holidays unless such work is ordered in writing by the Engineer.

GC-33. SUPERVISION OF WORK

- A. During the progress of the work, the Contractor shall employ a competent superintendent and any necessary assistants at the job site. The superintendent shall not be changed except with the approval of the Engineer (or upon the order of the Engineer should the superintendent be or become unsatisfactory to the Engineer) unless the superintendent proves to be unsatisfactory to the Contractor and ceases to be in his/her employ. The superintendent shall represent the Contractor in the Contractor's absence and all directions given to him shall be as binding as if given to the Contractor. Important directions shall be so confirmed on written request in each case.
- B. The Contractor shall give efficient supervision to the work, using his/her best skill and attention. he/she shall carefully study and compare all drawings, specifications and other instructions and shall at once report to the Engineer any error, inconsistency or omission which he/she may discover, but he/she shall not be held responsible for their existence or discovery.

GC-34. CORRECTION AND COMPLETION OF WORK

- A. Correction of Work before Final Payment:
 - 1. The Contractor shall promptly remove from the premises all materials condemned by the Engineer as failing to conform to the contract, whether incorporated in the work or not, and shall re-execute any work condemned by the Engineer as failing to conform to the contract, and the Contractor shall promptly replace such non-conforming materials and re-execute such non-conforming work in accordance with the contract, such costs of replacement and re-execution to be borne by Contractor at no additional expense to the Owner or the City.
 - 2. If the Contractor does not re-execute such non-conforming work and/or remove and replace such non-conforming materials within a reasonable time, fixed by written notice of the Engineer, then and in that event the OWNER or City may remove them and may store the material at the expense of the Contractor. If the Contractor does not pay the expenses of such removal within ten (10) days time thereafter, the OWNER or City may, upon ten (10) days written notice, sell such materials at auction or at private sale and shall account to Contractor for the net proceeds thereof, after deducting all the costs and expenses of such removal, storage, sale and repair. Nothing contained herein shall relieve the Contractor from his/her responsibility to perform the work in accordance with the Contract Documents, nor to reduce the liability of the Contractor to replace such non-conforming materials or re-execute such non-conforming work.
- B. Correction of Work after Final Payment: Neither the final certificate, nor payment, nor any provision in the Contract Documents shall relieve the Contractor of responsibility for faulty and/or non-conforming materials or workmanship and unless otherwise specified, he/she shall remedy any defects due thereto and pay for any damage to other work resulting there from, which shall appear within a period of one (1) year from the date of final acceptance and as specified in GC-7. The OWNER or City shall give notice of observed defects with reasonable promptness.
- B. Deductions for Uncorrected Work: If the Engineer and the OWNER or City deem it inexpedient to correct work injured or done not in accordance with the contract, an equitable deduction from the contract price shall be made therefore.

GC-35. SUBSTITUTES CLAUSE

In order to establish a basis of quality, certain processes, types of machinery and equipment, or kinds of material, may be specified on the plans or herein, by designating a manufacturer by name and referring to his/her brand or product designation. It is not the intent of these specifications to exclude other processes, equipment or materials or a type and quality equal to those designated.

- A. The materials, products and equipment described in the bidding documents establish a standard or required function, dimension, appearance and quality to be met by any proposed substitution.
- B. Approval of alternate and equal specified equipment and material will be only by addenda issued by the Engineer at least five (5) days prior to the award of contract. All such requests must be accompanied by drawings and specifications in sufficient detail to allow the Engineer to determine whether or not the equipment and materials proposed is equal to that specified. The determination as to whether or not the proposed substitute equals that specified, shall rest solely with the OWNER or City, based upon the opinion of the Engineer. The burden of proof of the merit of the proposed substitute shall be upon the proposer.
- C. No extras will be allowed by the Contractor for any changes required to adopt the substitute equipment; therefore, the Contractor's proposal, including the approved alternate, shall include all costs for any modifications to the plans such as structural and foundation changes, additional piping or changes in piping, electrical changes, or any other modifications which may be necessary or required for approval and adoption of the proposed alternate equipment.

GC-36. DETAILED BREAKDOWN OF CONTRACT PRICE

The Contractor shall within five (5) days after receipt of Notice to Proceed submit a complete breakdown of all lump sum bid items showing the value assigned to each part of the work, including an allowance for profit and overhead.

GC-37. CONTRACTOR'S RESPONSIBILITY FOR UTILITY PROPERTIES AND SERVICE

Certain utilities and structures which are expected to be adjacent to or encountered in the work are shown on the plans. It is known that there are discrepancies and omissions in the locations and quantities of existing utilities and structures shown. Those shown are for the convenience of the Contractor only, and no responsibility is assumed by either the OWNER or City or the Engineer for their accuracy or completeness.

- A. It is the Contractor's responsibility to notify "DIG-LINE/ONE CALL" at 811 prior to excavating and to comply with Idaho Code Section 55-2207 and all other applicable laws and regulations regarding the protection of underground utilities.
- B. At points where the Contractor's operations could cause damage which might result in considerable expense, loss, and inconvenience when his/her operations are adjacent to or near a railway, telephone, television, power, oil, gas, water, sewer, irrigation, or other private or municipal systems, the operations shall be suspended until all arrangements necessary for the protection thereof have been made by the Contractor.
- C. The Contractor shall notify all utility offices which are affected by the construction operation at least forty-eight (48) hours in advance of such construction. Under no circumstances shall the Contractor expose any utility without first requesting permission from and being granted to do so from the affected agency. Once permission has been granted, Contractor shall locate, if necessary, and expose all existing underground utilities in advance of any trenching operation. Hand digging shall be required within twenty-four (24) inches of a marked utility.

- D. The Contractor shall protect all poles from damage. If interfering power poles, telephone poles, guy wires, or anchors are encountered the Contractor shall notify the Engineer and the affected utility company at least forty eight (48) hours in advance of construction operations to permit the necessary arrangements to be made with the affected utility company for protection or relocation of the interfering structure.
- E. The Contractor shall be solely and directly responsible to the owners and operators of such properties for any damage, injury, expense, loss, inconvenience, delay, suits, actions, or claims, of any character brought because of any injuries or damage which may result from the carrying out of the work to be done under the contract. Contractor shall hold harmless, indemnify and defend the OWNER or City from any such claims.
- F. In the event of interruption to domestic water, sewer, storm drain, or to other utility services as a result of accidental breakage, or as a result of being exposed or unsupported, the Contractor shall promptly notify the proper authority. After such notification, the Contractor shall cooperate with said authority in restoration of service as promptly as possible and the Contractor shall bear all costs of repair. In no case shall interruption of any water or utility service be allowed to exist beyond working hours unless prior approval is received from the Engineer.
- G. In the event the Contractor encounters utility lines that interfere with trenching, the Contractor may, by obtaining prior written approval of the appropriate utility company, cut the service, dig through and restore the service with similar and equal materials at the Contractor's expense.

GC-38. STREET CLEANUP DURING CONSTRUCTION

The Contractor shall immediately clean all spilled dirt, gravel, and other foreign material caused by the construction operations from all streets open to public use. Streets within the project's work zone closed to public use shall be cleaned prior to weekends and prior to opening to public use.

GC-39. WORKMANSHIP AND CLEAN UP

It is the intent and purpose of these specifications and plans to obtain good workmanship throughout with the completed work complying with the said specifications and plans and in full working order upon completion. Work will not be accepted until this result is obtained.

The Contractor shall at all times during the work keep the premises clean and orderly. He/she shall promptly remove all waste materials and rubbish. All directions from the Engineer and all authorized public officials having jurisdiction over health and safety shall be obeyed.

Any damage to private property shall be repaired, replaced in kind, or the Owner compensated as required by the General Specifications.

Upon the satisfactory completion of all work embraced in the contract and specifications, including the cleanup, together with full compliance with the requirements of the General Specifications the Engineer will, within fifteen (15) days after such completion and compliance, issue a certificate of completion to the Owner with two (2) copies to the Contractor

GC-40. JURISDICTION AND VENUE

The District Court for the 4th Judicial District of the State of Idaho in and for Valley County, Idaho is accepted as the proper forum having jurisdiction for any legal disputes between the parties.

GC-41. PERMITS AND LICENSES

The Contractor shall obtain and pay for all permits and licenses, including but not limited to the following:

A. Those required by the McCall_City Code, such as:

Right-of-way Code MCC 8-12-1 et.seq. Building Code MCC 2-1-040

Contractor Licensing Ordinance registered with State of Idaho

- B. Those required by the Idaho Code or other State Law.
- C. Those required by the Code of Federal Regulations or other Federal Law.

The OWNER shall reimburse the CONTRACTOR for the cost of all fees and permits associated with City of McCall, Idaho Power and the Idaho Transportation Department. The reimbursement amount shall be limited to the permit fee. All CONTRACTOR costs associated in obtaining the permit shall be incidental to the WORK.

GC-42. NO THIRD PARTY BENEFICIARIES

No claim as a third party beneficiary under this contract by any person other than Contractor shall be made or shall be valid against the OWNER or City, and the OWNER or City shall not be liable for or be held to pay any money to such person.

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VI. SUPLEMENTARY CONDITIONS

All work on the project shall conform to the 2017 ISPWC, with the following exceptions to the ISPWC as noted in this section. These Supplementary Conditions amend or supplement the Standard General Conditions per 2017 ISPWC and other provisions of the Contract Documents as indicated below. All provisions, which are not so amended or supplemented remain in full force and effect.

Supplementary Conditions Structure

The Special Provisions noted herein comprise a document that: supplements, adds new specifications, replaces, deletes or modifies the Standard Specifications. For clarification of the purpose of the sections provided, these Special Provisions have the following added section descriptions:

Supplement: Text that supplements or adds clarification to the identified section of the Standard Specifications.

Added: Item is unique to this project and will not be found in the Standard Specifications.

Replacement: Replaces the entire identified section of the Standard Specifications with the text provided.

Revised: A revision or partial revision of the identified sentence, paragraph, or section of the Standard Specifications.

Deleted: The identified sentence, paragraph or section of the Standard Specifications is deleted.

SECTION 100 - GENERAL CONDITIONS

SC-1.01.A. Add the following language to 1.01.A.:

Bonds - Performance and payment bonds and other instruments of security furnished by the CONTRACTOR.

Final Acceptance - The Final Acceptance comes at the end of the warranty period. The warranty period for the work is one year. The Contractor must have completed all work and repairs to the satisfaction of the OWNER from the Notice to Proceed before the Final Acceptance. Only after the Final Acceptance can the Bond be released.

Payment Bond - The form of security approved by the Owner, and furnished by the Contractor and his surety guaranteeing payment of all labor, material, equipment, and all other obligations arising out of the work.

Performance Bond - The form of security approved by the Owner, furnished by the Contractor and his surety guaranteeing the complete and faithful performance of all of the obligations and conditions placed upon the Contractor by the Contract.

SC-1.01.A9. Delete the language of 1.01.A.9 and replace with the following:

Change Order--A written order signed by CONTRACTOR and OWNER authorizing the addition, deletion, or revision to the Contract Document, issued on or after the Effective Date of the Agreement. The Change Order form to be used on this Project is Document 00910.

SC-1.01.A12. Delete the language of 1.01.A.12 and replace with the following:

Contract Documents--The Contract Documents establish the rights and obligations of the parties and include the Agreement, Addenda, Instruction to Bidders, Contractor's Proposal, all bonds, Notice of Award, Notice to Proceed, Drawings, General Conditions, CONTRACTOR'S documentation accompanying the Bid, ENGINEER's written interpretation or clarification issued on or after the Effective Date of the Agreement, Technical Specifications, Change Orders, field orders, and all other modifications of such documents entered

into in accordance with the Contract. Only printed or hard copies of the items listed in this paragraph are Contract Documents. Files in electronic format of text, data, and graphics are not Contract Documents. Approved Shop Drawings and the reports and drawings of subsurface and physical conditions are not Contract Documents.

In resolving inconsistencies among two or more sections of the Contract Documents, precedence shall be given in the following order:

- a) Contract
- b) Technical Specifications
- c) Drawings
- d) Instructions to Bidders
- e) Supplementary Conditions
- f) 2017 ISPWC

SC-2.02.A. Delete the paragraph 2.02.A and replace with the following:

OWNER shall furnish to CONTRACTOR up to three copies of the Contract Documents. Additional copies will be furnished upon request at cost of reproduction.

SC-2.03.A. Delete paragraph 2.03.A and replace with the following:

The Contract Time will commence to run on the day indicated in the Notice to Proceed. A Notice to Proceed may be given at any time within thirty (30) days after the Effective Date of the Agreement.

SC-2.07 Delete Section SC-2.07.

- SC-4.02 Add the following new paragraph immediately after paragraph 4.02.B.
 - C. In the preparation of Drawings and Specifications, ENGINEER or ENGINEER's Consultants relied upon the following reports of exploration and tests of subsurface conditions at the Site: None
 - D. In the preparation of Drawings and Specifications, ENGINEER or ENGINEER's Consultants relied upon the following drawings of physical conditions in or relating to existing surface and subsurface structures (except Underground Facilities) which are at or contiguous to the Site: topographic survey prepared by Secesh Engineering
 - E. If any items of suspected historical or archaeological value are uncovered during Construction, the contractor will be required to stop work and contact the Idaho State Historic Preservation Office and the Idaho Department of Commerce.
- SC-4.06 Add the following new paragraph immediately after paragraph 4.02.A.
 - 1. In the preparation of Drawings and Specifications, ENGINEER or ENGINEER's Consultants relied upon the following reports of Hazardous Environmental Conditions at the Site: None available.
 - 2. In the preparation of Drawings and Specifications, ENGINEER or ENGINEER's Consultants relied upon the following drawings of Hazardous Environmental Conditions which are at or contiguous to the Site: None available.

SC-6.02B Delete Section 6.02B and replace with the following:

B. Except as otherwise required for the safety or protection of persons or the Work or property at the Site or adjacent thereto, and except as otherwise stated in the Contract Documents, all Work at the Site shall be performed between the hours of 7 am and 7 pm.

SC-6.06.B. Supplement paragraph 6.06.B of the General Conditions as follows:

In addition to subcontractors for plumbing, heating and air-conditioning work, and electrical work, CONTRACTOR shall provide the names and addresses and other requested information of the additional subcontractors, suppliers, individuals or entities listed below (include Idaho Public Works Contractor License Numbers for any subcontractors) within 5 days after Bid opening.

SC-7.01.D. through 7.01.F. Add new paragraphs immediately following paragraph 7.01.C of the General Conditions as follows:

7.01.D. Should CONTRACTOR cause damage to the work or property of any separate contractor at the site, or should any claim arising out of or resulting from CONTRACTOR's performance of the Work at the site be made by any separate contractor against CONTRACTOR, OWNER, ENGINEER, or ENGINEER's Consultants or any other person, CONTRACTOR shall promptly attempt to settle with such other contractor by agreement, or to otherwise resolve the dispute by mediation, arbitration or at law. CONTRACTOR shall, to the fullest extent permitted by Laws and Regulations, indemnify and hold OWNER, ENGINEER, and ENGINEER's Consultants and the officers, directors, employees, agents, and other consultants of each and any of them harmless from and against all claims, costs, losses and damages, (including, but not limited to, all fees and charges of engineers, architects, attorneys and other professionals and all court or arbitration or other dispute resolution costs) arising directly, indirectly or consequentially out of or resulting from any action, legal or equitable, brought by a separate contractor against OWNER, ENGINEER, or ENGINEER's Consultants or the officers, directors, employees, agents, or other consultants of each and any of them to the extent based on a claim caused by, arising out of, or resulting from CONTRACTOR's performance of the Work.

7.01.E. Should a separate contractor cause damage to the Work or property of CONTRACTOR or should the performance of work by any separate contractor at the site give rise to any other claim, CONTRACTOR shall not institute any action, legal or equitable, against OWNER, ENGINEER, or ENGINEER's Consultants or the officers, directors, employees, agents, or other consultants of each and any of them or permit any action against any of them to be maintained and continued in its name or for its benefit in any court or before any mediator or arbitrator which seeks to impose liability on or to recover damages from OWNER, ENGINEER, or ENGINEER's Consultants or the officers, directors, employees, agents, or other consultants of each and any of them on account of any such damage or claim.

7.01.F. If CONTRACTOR is delayed at any time in performing or furnishing Work by any act or neglect of a separate contractor and OWNER and CONTRACTOR are unable to agree as to the extent of any adjustment in Contract Times attributable thereto, CONTRACTOR may make a claim for an extension of time in accordance with Article 12. An extension of the Contract Times shall be CONTRACTOR's exclusive remedy with respect to OWNER, ENGINEER, or ENGINEER's Consultants or the officers, directors, employees, agents, or other consultants of each and any of them for any delay, disruption, interference or hindrance caused by any separate contractor. This paragraph does not prevent recovery from OWNER, ENGINEER, or ENGINEER's Consultants or the officers, directors, employees, agents, or other consultants of each and any of them for activities that are their respective responsibilities.

SC-9.03 Add the following new paragraphs immediately after Paragraph 9.03.A:

- B. The Resident Project Representative (RPR) will be Engineer's employee or agent at the Site, will act as directed by and under the supervision of Engineer, and will confer with Engineer regarding RPR's actions. RPR's dealings in matters pertaining to the Work in general shall be with Engineer and Contractor. RPR's dealings with Subcontractors shall be through or with the full knowledge and approval of Contractor. The RPR shall:
 - 1. *Schedules:* Review the progress schedule, schedule of Shop Drawing and Sample submittals, and schedule of values prepared by Contractor and consult with Engineer concerning acceptability.

2. Conferences and Meetings: Attend meetings with Contractor, such as preconstruction conferences, progress meetings, job conferences and other project-related meetings, and prepare and circulate copies of minutes thereof.

3. Liaison:

- a. Serve as Engineer's liaison with Contractor, working principally through Contractor's authorized representative, assist in providing information regarding the intent of the Contract Documents.
- b. Assist Engineer in serving as Owner's liaison with Contractor when Contractor's operations affect Owner's on-Site operations.
- c. Assist in obtaining from Owner additional details or information, when required for proper execution of the Work.
- 4. *Interpretation of Contract Documents:* Report to Engineer when clarifications and interpretations of the Contract Documents are needed and transmit to Contractor clarifications and interpretations as issued by Engineer.
- 5. Shop Drawings and Samples:
 - a. Record date of receipt of Samples and approved Shop Drawings.
 - b. Receive Samples which are furnished at the Site by Contractor, and notify Engineer of availability of Samples for examination.
- 6. *Modifications:* Consider and evaluate Contractor's suggestions for modifications in Drawings or Specifications and report such suggestions, together with RPR's recommendations, to Engineer. Transmit to Contractor in writing decisions as issued by Engineer.
- 7. Review of Work and Rejection of Defective Work:
 - a. Conduct on-Site observations of Contractor's work in progress to assist Engineer in determining if the Work is in general proceeding in accordance with the Contract Documents.
 - b. Report to Engineer whenever RPR believes that any part of Contractor's work in progress will not produce a completed Project that conforms generally to the Contract Documents or will imperil the integrity of the design concept of the completed Project as a functioning whole as indicated in the Contract Documents, or has been damaged, or does not meet the requirements of any inspection, test or approval required to be made; and advise Engineer of that part of work in progress that RPR believes should be corrected or rejected or should be uncovered for observation, or requires special testing, inspection or approval.
- 8. Inspections, Tests, and System Startups:
 - a. Verify that tests, equipment, and systems start-ups and operating and maintenance training are conducted in the presence of appropriate Owner's personnel, and that Contractor maintains adequate records thereof.
 - b. Observe, record, and report to Engineer appropriate details relative to the test procedures and systems start-ups.
- 9. Records:

- a. Record names, addresses, fax numbers, e-mail addresses, web site locations, and telephone numbers of all Contractors, Subcontractors, and major Suppliers of materials and equipment.
- b. Maintain records for use in preparing Project documentation.

10. Reports:

- a. Furnish to Engineer periodic reports as required of progress of the Work and of Contractor's compliance with the progress schedule and schedule of Shop Drawing and Sample submittals.
- b. Draft and recommend to Engineer proposed Change Orders, Work Change Directives, and Field Orders. Obtain backup material from Contractor.
- c. Immediately notify Engineer of the occurrence of any Site accidents, emergencies, acts of God endangering the Work, damage to property by fire or other causes, or the discovery of any Hazardous Environmental Condition.
- 11. *Payment Requests:* Review Applications for Payment with Contractor for compliance with the established procedure for their submission and forward with recommendations to Engineer, noting particularly the relationship of the payment requested to the schedule of values, Work completed, and materials and equipment delivered at the Site but not incorporated in the Work.
- 12. Certificates, Operation and Maintenance Manuals: During the course of the Work, verify that materials and equipment certificates, operation and maintenance manuals and other data required by the Specifications to be assembled and furnished by Contractor are applicable to the items actually installed and in accordance with the Contract Documents, and have these documents delivered to Engineer for review and forwarding to Owner prior to payment for that part of the Work.

13. Completion:

- a. Participate in a Substantial Completion inspection, assist in the determination of Substantial Completion and the preparation of lists of items to be completed or corrected.
- b. Participate in a final inspection in the company of Engineer, Owner, and Contractor and prepare a final list of items to be completed and deficiencies to be remedied.
- c. Observe whether all items on the final list have been completed or corrected and make recommendations to Engineer concerning acceptance and issuance of the Notice of Acceptability of the Work.

C. The RPR shall not:

- 1. Authorize any deviation from the Contract Documents or substitution of materials or equipment (including "or-equal" items).
- 2. Exceed limitations of Engineer's authority as set forth in the Contract Documents.
- 3. Undertake any of the responsibilities of Contractor, Subcontractors, Suppliers, or Contractor's superintendent.
- 4. Advise on, issue directions relative to, or assume control over any aspect of the means, methods, techniques, sequences or procedures of Contractor's work unless such advice or directions are specifically required by the Contract Documents.

- 5. Advise on, issue directions regarding, or assume control over safety practices, precautions, and programs in connection with the activities or operations of Owner or Contractor.
- 6. Participate in specialized field or laboratory tests or inspections conducted off-site by others except as specifically authorized by Engineer.
- 7. Accept Shop Drawing or Sample submittals from anyone other than Contractor.
- 8. Authorize Owner to occupy the Project in whole or in part.
- SC-12.01.C.2.c. Supplement paragraph 12.01.C.2.c of the General Conditions as follows:
 - , except the maximum total allowable cost to OWNER shall be the Cost of the Work plus a maximum collective aggregate fee for CONTRACTOR and all tiered Subcontractors of 10 percent;
- SC-13.03.A. Supplement paragraph 13.03.A of the General Conditions as follows:

CONTRACTOR shall establish an inspection program and a testing plan acceptable to the ENGINEER and shall maintain complete inspection and testing records available to ENGINEER.

SC-13.03.D. Supplement paragraph 13.03.D of the General Conditions as follows:

Tests required by Contract Documents to be performed by CONTRACTOR and that require test certificates be submitted to OWNER or ENGINEER for acceptance shall be made by an independent testing laboratory or agency licensed or certified in accordance with Laws and Regulations and applicable state and local statutes. In the event state license or certification is not required, testing laboratories or agencies shall meet following applicable requirements:

13.03.D.1. Basic requirements of ASTM E 329, "Standard Specification for Agencies Engaged in the Testing and/or Inspection of Materials as Used in Construction" and ASTM D 3666, "Standard Specification for Minimum Requirements for Agency Testing and Inspecting Bituminous Paving Materials", as applicable.

13.03.D.2. Calibrate testing equipment at reasonable intervals by devices of accuracy traceable to either the National Bureau of Standards or accepted values of natural physical constants.

SC-14.02C Delete "Twenty-one" and replace it with "Thirty".

SC-16.01.B. Add new paragraphs immediately following paragraph 16.01.A of the General Conditions as follows:

16.01.B. Mediation:

16.01.B.1. All appealed or unsettled claims, disputes or other matters between OWNER and CONTRACTOR arising out of or relating to the Contract Documents or the breach thereof, (except for claims which have been waived by the making or acceptance of final payment as provided by paragraph 14.09) shall first be submitted to mediation under the Construction Industry Mediation Rules of the American Arbitration Association then obtaining prior to either of them exercising any rights or remedies as either may otherwise have under the Contract Documents or by Laws or Regulations in respect of any dispute.

Should the mediation be unsuccessful, (except for claims which have been waived by the making or acceptance of final payment as provided by paragraph 14.09) and is terminated by written notice to all involved by Mediator or OWNER or CONTRACTOR, the dispute resolution process shall revert to paragraph 10.05.B.2.c in the Supplementary Conditions, as if the mediation had been a second phase of the unsuccessful executive negotiation.

16.01.B.3. Notice of demand for mediation shall be filed in writing with the other party to the Agreement and with the American Arbitration Association with a copy to the ENGINEER for information. Any demand for mediation of any appealed or unsettled claim, dispute or other matter that is required to be referred to ENGINEER initially for decision in accordance with

paragraph 9.09 shall be filed by the appealing party within 10 days after the executive negotiation has been declared unsuccessful by the OWNER or CONTRACTOR, and in all other cases within a reasonable time after the unsettled claim, dispute or other matter has arisen, and in no event shall any such demand be made after the date when institution of legal or equitable proceedings based on such unsettled claim, dispute or other matter would be barred by the applicable statute of limitations. Failure to demand mediation within said 10-day period will result in Engineer's decision being final.

9. Install and maintain High Visibility Robust Security Fencing in accordance with the plans or directed by the Construction Manager to separate and protect the general public from entering the work site.

Add the following after 3.1.A.8:

- 9. When fire hydrants are removed, remove all elements from the mainline to hydrant and install a blind flange on the tee. Deliver entire hydrant assembly (valve to hydrant) to City of McCall Public Works. Call 208-634-5580 to coordinate for time and location of delivery.
- 10. When water meters are removed, deliver meters, setters, and box to City of McCall Public Works. Call 208-634-5580 to coordinate for time and location of delivery.

ADD Paragraph 3.2.A.5, as follows:

Prior to commencing work, coordinate work with the City of McCall Public Works Department, property owners, and businesses. This includes protection of trees and root zones."

Part 3.2 B Removal and Disposal is supplemented with the following:

6. In removing pavement, sidewalks, curbs, and gutters, the contractor shall:

- Make a vertical saw cut between and existing pavement, sidewalk, curb, or gutter that is to remain and the portion to be removed.
- Haul and dispose of broken-up pieces off the project site to an authorized refuse center
- Replace at no expense to the Owner any existing pavement or concrete designated to remain that is damaged during the removal of other pavement or concrete.

Part 4.4.1.F is supplemented with the following:

The blind flange, joint restraints or thrust block, and all appurtenances are considered incidental to removal of fire hydrants.

- B. The Contractor shall dispose of suitable fill material, including excavated soils not required for "Borrow", at the City of McCall Riverfront Park site. The determination of suitable fill material shall be made by the Engineer and approved by the Owner prior to any hauling of material to the Riverfront Park site. Heavy organics, broken concrete, and other construction debris will not be accepted as suitable fill material. If the contractor chooses to dispose of suitable fill material at the Riverfront Park site, the contractor must provide equipment (i.e. front-end loader or the like) at the park site to perform reasonable spreading and/or shaping of the hauled material at the direction of the Owner prior to project completion. All costs for this work and hauling of any such material shall be considered incidental to the unit contract price for related contract items and no separate payment will be made.

If the Contractor believes that the actual quantity of a contract pay item differs significantly from the plan or construction documents quantity, submit a written request for the Engineer to measure the actual quantity. If the value of the actual quantity measured does not exceed the value of the plan quantity by \$2,000.00. Contractor shall reimburse the Owner for the cost of measurement.

- B. Provide the Engineer with 24-hours advanced notice prior to completing utility explorations; confirm utility exploration locations with Engineer prior to completing explorations.
- C. Document the horizontal and vertical location of the utilities, pipe material type, and utility owner.
- D. Provide written documentation to Engineer within 24 hours of completing explorations.

Delete 2.2 A. and replace it with the following:

A. Exploratory Excavation: The Contractor shall utilize a hydraulic excavator with a minimum of 148 net flywheel horsepower with a ¼ cubic yard or larger bucket to complete the excavations and a sheep's foot roller or vibrator plate compactor to complete the backfill or Engineer approved equal equipment; the Contractor shall provide one laborer with shovel to assist with exploratory excavation.

Add the following after 2.2. D:

E. Vacuum Truck Exploration: The Contractor shall provide a vacuum truck with a minimum 3,200 CFM blower and high-pressure air; using pressurized water is not acceptable.

Delete 3.1 D. and replace it with the following:

- F. At the locations shown on the Contract Documents or as requested by the Engineer, provide the fueled and operated vacuum truck to perform explorations.
- G. The Contractor shall complete explorations to locate existing waterlines at the onset of construction to understand the extent of the work that is necessary for connections to these lines. Other locations requiring explorations may arise during construction; the Engineer will determine these locations in the field and provide written direction to the Contractor to complete the explorations.
- H. The Contractor shall use caution completing this work and repair all damage to existing utility lines or adjacent facilities at no additional cost to the project. No increases to the schedule will be allowed due to damages or repairs to utilities.
- I. Exploration work completed by the Contractor will result in additional information that is necessary for construction. Based on the additional information, the Engineer may direct the Contractor to complete work in accordance with the unit price pay items included in the Bid Schedule, or the Engineer will request that the Contractor provide prices for a change order if the work falls outside the unit price pay items included in the Bid Schedule. Exploration work will generate change orders only when the Contractor can demonstrate that the work required varies from the unit price pay items in the Bid Schedule.

3.3 MAINTENANCE AND INSPECTION PROCEDURES

- A. All erosion control structures and stabilization practices will be inspected by the CONTRACTOR on a weekly basis (or monthly during the winter when the ground is frozen), and after any storm event of 0.5 inches or greater.
 - The CONTRACTOR will all keep a detailed record of inspections, maintenance and discharge events.
 - 2. All erosion control structures and stabilization practices shall be maintained in good working condition throughout the duration of the construction project.
 - a. Where silt fences or wattles are used around catch basins, trapped sediment shall be removed by the CONTRACTOR when one-third of the height of the silt fence or wattle is covered by sediment.

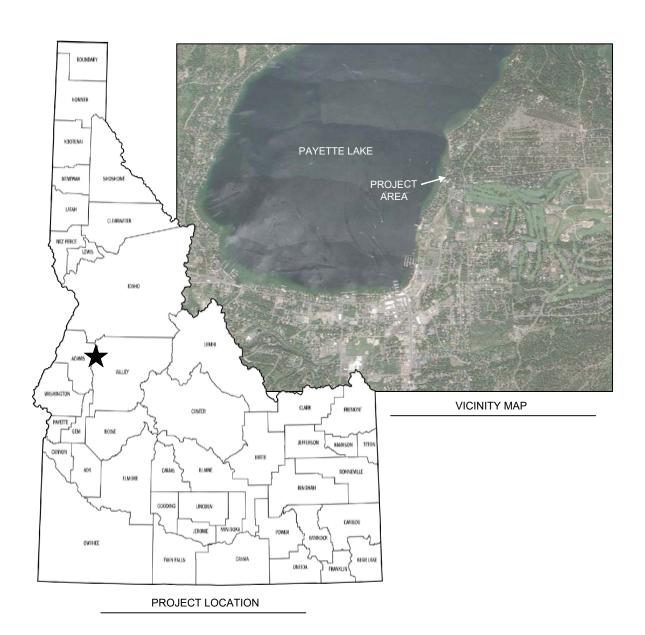

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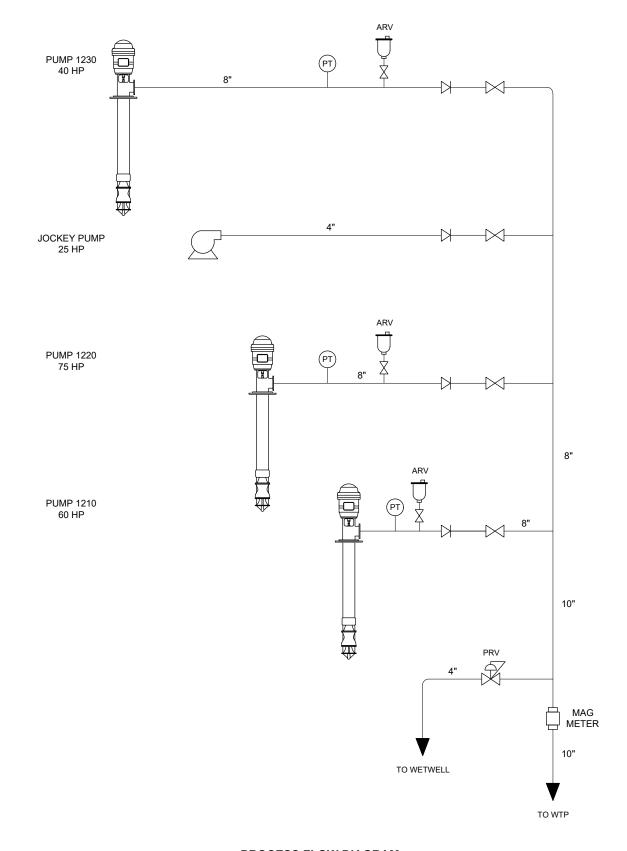

PROCESS FLOW DIAGRAM

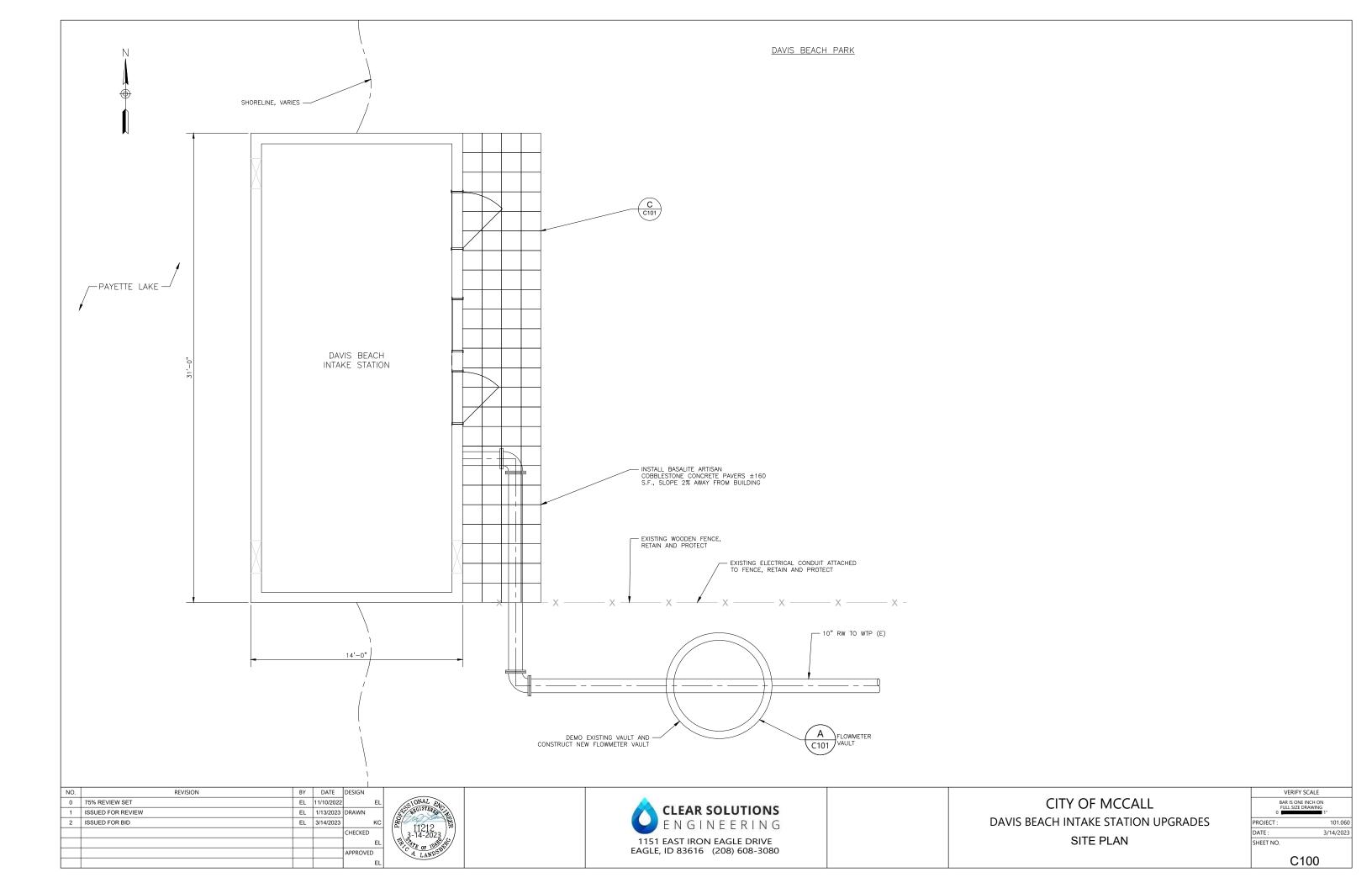


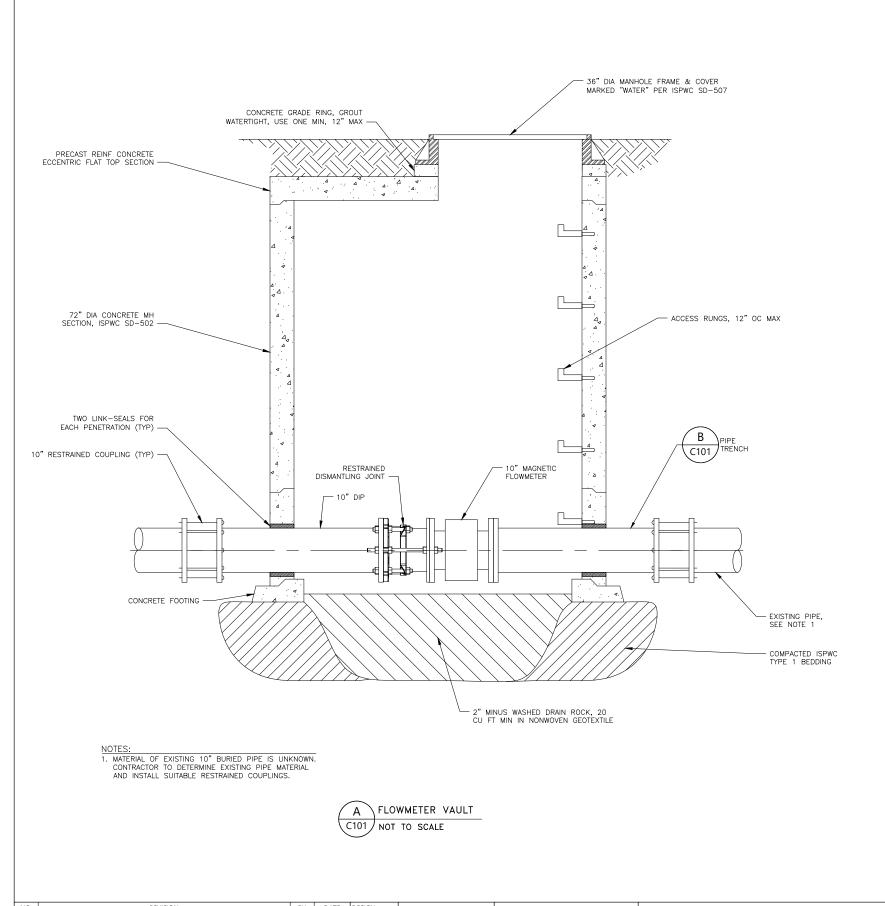


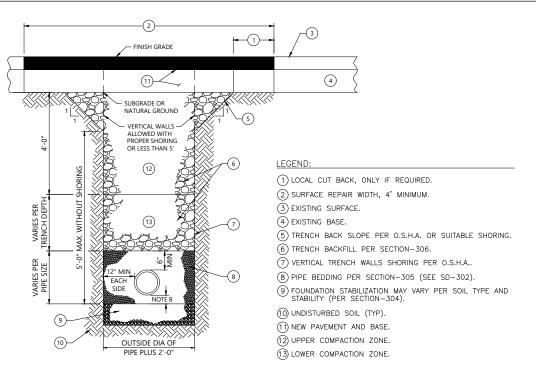

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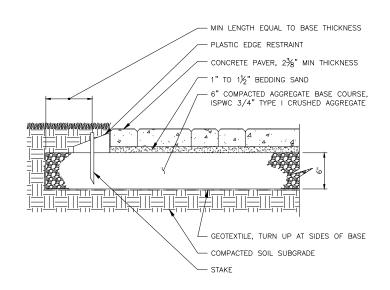

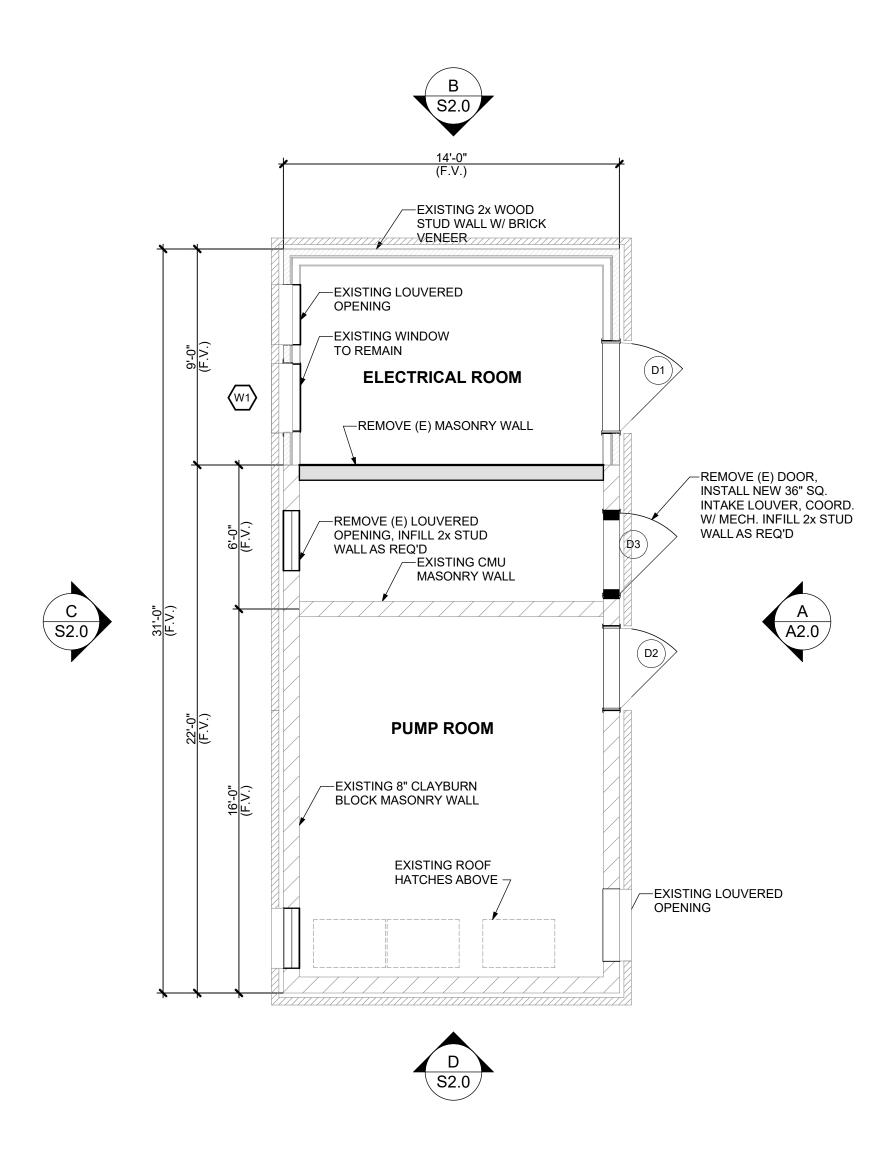

EXISTING & PROPOSED FLOOR PLANS





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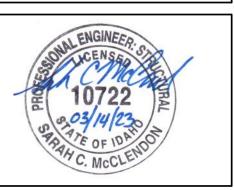
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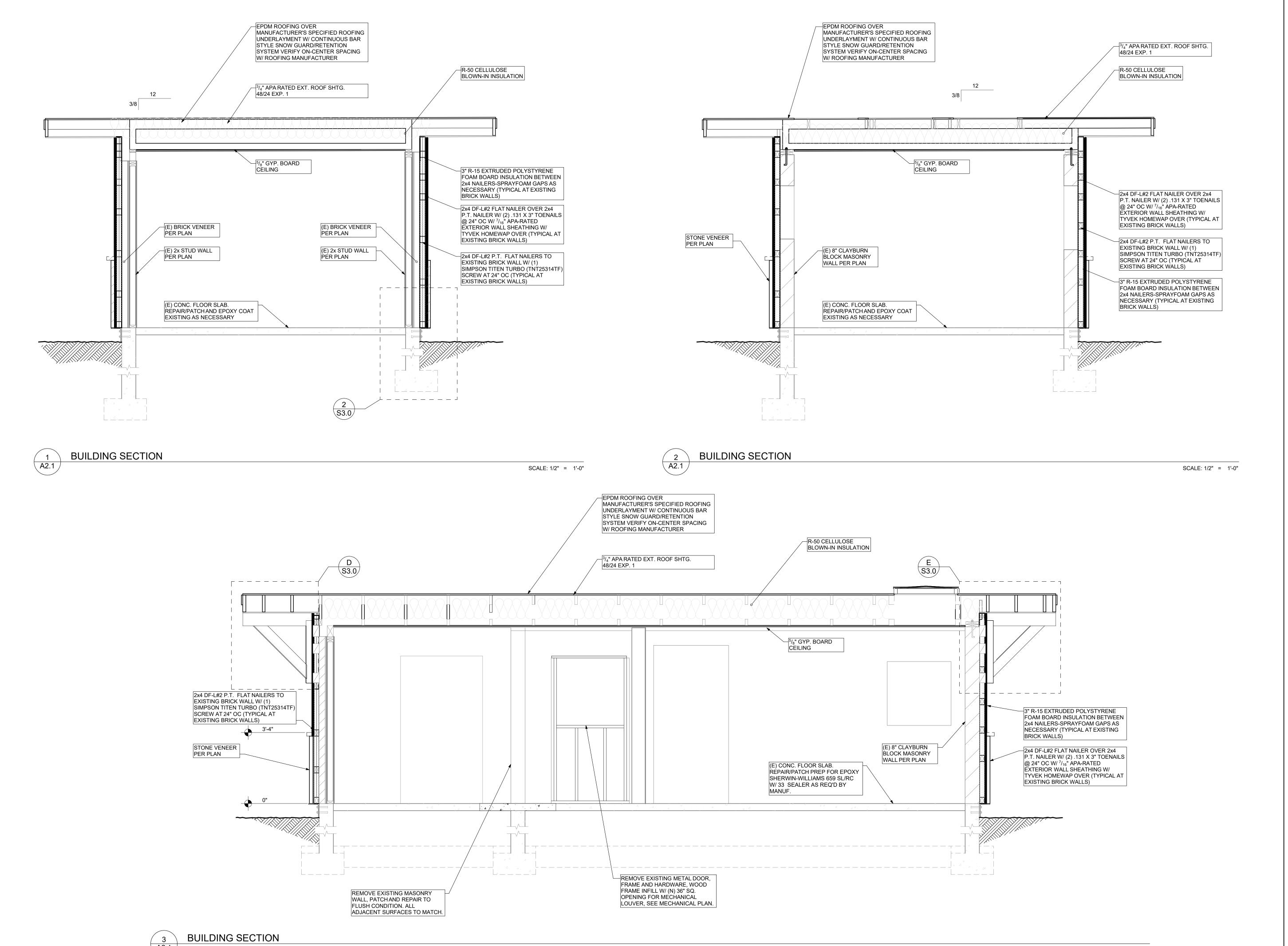

Bids for the McCall Gold Course Clubhouse Access Improvements – Phase 2 Project were received and opened on April 7, 2023. We have reviewed the one bid received, with the following results:

- Dyrud Construction in the amount of \$321,331.20 for the Base Bid
 - \$55,062.50 for Bid Alt #1
 - Combination of Base Bid and Bid Alt #1 = \$376,393.70

The Engineer's Estimate for the project construction cost, which accounts for the current volatile construction market, was \$208,742.98 for the combination of the Base Bid and Bid Alt #1. Dyrud Construction's received bid is 80.31% above the Engineer's Estimate for the combination of Base Bid and Bid Alt #1. A complete breakdown of the estimate and received bid is provided in the attached Bid Tabulation.

At this time, it is difficult to predict if future construction costs will continue to increase or if they may decrease, but it is the opinion of the Project Team that the bid received was well outside of the available budget presented by Eric McCormick for the project and that the Engineer's Estimate more accurately reflects current pricing and quotes from other local contractors in the area who have expressed interest in the project, but were unable to bid on it due to scheduling conflicts. As such, our recommendation is to reject the bid received and put the project back out to bid at a later date that will be more favorable for contractor scheduling.

SUMMARY STATEMENT:

On January 12, 2023 City Council reviewed the Staff recommendation to change the Annual Vendor fee to \$140 to match the Business License fee for a new business and to cover the extra time it takes to get the proper approvals from the landowners. This fee would cover a Vendor that is in one location for a year. The Vendor would, however, must pay the \$50 a day fee if they chose to move locations. At that time staff also recommend eliminating the 6 month permit fee. These fees more accurately cover staff time to administer.

After considering Council's questions and comments staff later recommended the annual fee to be clarified as a 3-12 month permit in the same location, maintaining the \$50 a day fee if they choose to move locations.

On March 9, 2023 Council adopted Resolution 23-04 updating the Comprehensive fee schedule as follows \$50 Per Day

\$140 for 3-12 months in one location (Long Term fee)

\$50 Per Day added to Long Term fee when move locations

After working with the new fee schedule, the Clerk realized that the per-day fee should be a per-day or per-event fee, whichever is applicable, as it does not take any more staff time to prepare a daily permit than it does a per-event permit. Staff is requesting to hold a public hearing to reconsider the daily permit fee and change it to a per-day or per-event fee, whichever is applicable. The daily or event fee would still be applicable to a long term vendor who changes location.

RECOMMENDED ACTION:

Direct staff to schedule a public hearing to adopt the revised fees for the Daily Vendor Permits.

WHEREAS, Resolution 22-17 combined all previous fee schedules for Airport, Community and Economic Development, City Clerk, Convenience, Library, Parks, Recreation, Police Department, and Public Works into one City of McCall Comprehensive Fee Schedule Resolution with all departments' fees; and

WHEREAS, Resolution 22-32 Updated the fees that were adopted on October 6, 2022 to add a new fee for Short-term Rental Permits; and

WHEREAS, Resolution 22-35 Updated the fees that were adopted on October 20, 2022 to add a new fee for Parking and Snow Removal violations; and

WHEREAS, Resolution 23-04 Updated the fees that were adopted on March 9, 2023 to update Vendor Fees; and

WHEREAS, excluded from this resolution are the City Water Rates and Golf Rates, both of which will be adopted by separate resolutions; and

WHEREAS, McCall City Code provides that a fee schedule for various City services be established periodically by City Council; and

WHEREAS, Idaho Code 63-1311 allows cities to impose fees for services provided, fees must be reasonably related to the actual cost of the services; and

WHEREAS, the City of McCall has reviewed its procedures and has quantified the costs of processing and administering each application specific to that department; and

WHEREAS, notice of the proposed new fees was published in The Star News, a newspaper of general circulation within the City, on February 23 and March 2, 2023; and

Direct Cost recovery for programs for youth, seniors and individuals with disabilities shall be relatively low based on the formula for determining fees and charges, and adjusted by scholarship, discount, or waiving fees outright based on need.

Scholarships are available for participants to help offset the cost of the programs. Eligible recipients may receive up to a 100% fee waiver if they meet the guidelines established.

Scholarship forms may be obtained at the Parks and Recreation Department, online, or City Hall. All forms must be submitted to the Recreation Supervisor for review and then to the Parks and Recreation Director for approval.

Volunteers who are head coaches or instructors of classes, who have a child participating in the

program they are instructing or volunteering for, will receive a program fee waiver to cover 100% of the program fee for one child
