SUMMARY STATEMENT:

The City of McCall, Idaho is committed to ensuring the safety and security of all those living in and visiting the City. Fire is a serious public safety concern both locally and nationally, and homes are the locations where people are at greatest risk from fire. This year's Fire Prevention WeekTM (FPWTM) campaign, "Cooking safety starts with YOU". Pay attention to fire preventionTM, works to educate everyone about simple but important actions they can take to keep themselves and those around them safe when cooking. Cooking fires are the leading cause of home fires and home fire injuries. Unattended cooking is the leading cause of cooking fires and deaths. In a fire, mere seconds can mean the difference between a safe escape and a tragedy. Fire safety education isn't just for school children. Teenagers, adults, and the elderly are also at risk in fires, making it important for every member of the community to take some time every October during Fire Prevention Week to make sure they understand how to stay safe in case of a fire.

Since 1922, the NFPA has sponsored the public observance of Fire Prevention Week. In 1925, President Calvin Coolidge proclaimed Fire Prevention Week a national observance, making it the longest-running public health observance in our country. During Fire Prevention Week, children, adults, and teachers learn how to stay safe in case of a fire. Firefighters provide lifesaving public education to drastically decrease casualties caused by fires. Fire Prevention Week is observed each year during the week of October 9th in commemoration of the Great Chicago Fire, which began on October 8, 1871, and caused devastating damage. This horrific conflagration killed more than 250 people, left 100,000 homeless, destroyed more than 17,400 structures, and burned more than 2,000 acres of land.

In an effort to support the national proclamation of Fire Prevention Week and bring awareness to the citizens of McCall, staff requests the Council proclaim October 8-14, 2023 as Fire Prevention Week in McCall. WHEREAS, the city of McCall, Idaho is committed to ensuring the safety and security of all those living in and visiting McCall; and

WHEREAS, fire is a serious public safety concern both locally and nationally, and homes are the locations where people are at greatest risk from fire; and

WHEREAS, home fires killed more than 2,800 people in the United States in 2021, according to the National Fire Protection Association® (NFPA®), and fire departments in the United States responded to 338,000 home fires; and

WHEREAS, cooking is the leading cause of home fires in the United States and fire departments responded to more than 166,400 annually between 2016 and 2020; and

WHEREAS, two of every five home fires start in the kitchen with 31% of these fires resulting from unattended cooking; and

WHEREAS, more than half of reported non-fatal home cooking fire injuries occurred when the victims tried to fight the fire themselves; and

WHEREAS, children under five face a higher risk of non-fire burns associated with cooking than being burned in a cooking fire; and

WHEREAS, McCall's residents should turn pot handles toward the back of the stove; always keep a lid nearby when cooking; keep a three-foot kid-free zone around the stove, oven, and other things that could get hot; watch what they heat; and set a timer to remind them that they are cooking; and

WHEREAS, residents who have planned and practiced a home fire escape plan are more prepared and will therefore be more likely to survive a fire; and

WHEREAS, working smoke alarms cut the risk of dying in reported home fires almost in half; and

WHEREAS, McCall area first responders are dedicated to reducing the occurrence of home fires and home fire injuries through prevention and protection education; and

WHEREAS, McCall's residents are responsive to public education measures and are able to take personal steps to increase their safety from fire, especially in their homes; and

WHEREAS, the 2023 Fire Prevention WeekTM theme, "Cooking safety starts with YOU. Pay attention to fire preventionTM," effectively serves to remind us to stay alert and use caution when cooking to reduce the risk of kitchen fires.

THEREFORE, I, Robert S. Giles, Mayor of the City of McCall, with the Consent of the McCall City Council, do hereby proclaim October 8–14, 2023, as Fire Prevention Week in the City of McCall, and I urge all the people of McCall to check their kitchens for fire hazards and use safe cooking practices during Fire Prevention Week 2023, and to support the many public safety activities and efforts of McCall area fire and emergency services.

"COOK WITH CAUTION"


- Be on alert! If you are sleepy or have consumed alcohol don't use the stove or stovetop.
- Stay in the kitchen while you are frying, boiling, grilling, or broiling food. If you leave the kitchen for even a short period of time, turn off the stove.
- If you are simmering, baking, or roasting food, check it regularly, remain in the home while food is cooking, and use a timer to remind you that you are cooking.
- Keep anything that can catch fire oven mitts, wooden utensils, food packaging, towels or curtains — away from your stovetop.

If you have a small (grease) cooking fire and decide to fight the fire...

- On the stovetop, smother the flames by sliding a lid over the pan and turning off the burner. Leave the pan covered until it is completely cooled.
- For an oven fire, turn off the heat and keep the door closed.

If you have any doubt about fighting a small fire...

- Just get out! When you leave, close the door behind you to help contain the fire.
- Call 9-1-1 or the local emergency number from outside the home.



Have a "kid-free zone" of at least 3 feet (1 metre) around the stove and areas where hot food or drink is prepared or carried.

SUMMARY STATEMENT:

On April 27, 2023, the Council directed staff to move forward with a multi-step plan regarding wildlife education and outreach surrounding the proposal of a wildlife ordinance. On May 4, 2023, the city hosted a Wildlife Conversation to collect public opinion on short-term and long-term wildlife goals, as well as a possible feeding ordinance, with the intention of utilizing the discussion to support a healthy wild deer population in and around McCall. On June 8, 2023, staff presented the Council with a summary of public opinion from the Wildlife Conversation meeting, along with other takeaways derived from survey outreach, and introduced options moving forward.

On August 3, 2023, staff presented the Council with matrix data collected from other communities via the Wildlife Feeding Questionnaire, provided an opportunity for the Council to ask questions of additional wildlife professionals, and provided the Council with a draft Wildlife Feeding Ordinance for review. On September 14, 2023, staff presented an updated draft Wildlife Feeding Ordinance that had been amended by staff and legal counsel after careful review of recommendations from wildlife professionals.

ORDINANCE NO.	

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF McCALL, VALLEY COUNTY, IDAHO, AMENDING TITLE 5, PUBLIC SAFETY, CHAPTER 7, ANIMAL CONTROL, OF THE McCALL CITY CODE, TO-WIT: AMENDING SECTION 5.7.010, DEFINITIONS, TO ADD THE FOLLOWING DEFINITIONS: ATTRACTING/ATTRACTANT, BIRDS, EDIBLE MATERIAL, FEEDING/FEED, HABITUATED, PUBLIC EMPLOYEE, SQUIRRELS, WATERFOWL, WILD TURKEY, WILDLIFE AND AMEND THE DEFINITION FOR IMPOUNDED; ENACTING SECTION 5.7.400, FEEDING/ATTRACTING WILDLIFE PROHIBITION, TO PROHIBIT THE FEEDING OR ATTRACTING OF WILDLIFE WITHIN THE McCALL CITY LIMITS AND PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR VIOLATION; DIRECTING THE CITY CLERK; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the intentional feeding of wildlife can cause animals to congregate in areas hazardous to public safety, such as sidewalks and roadways; and

WHEREAS, the intentional feeding of wildlife can attract an increased number of predators to urban areas, resulting in conflict with humans and domestic animals.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF McCALL, IDAHO:

Section 1: That Section 5.7.010, *Definitions*, of the McCall City Code is hereby AMENDED as follows, to-wit:

See Exhibit "A" attached hereto and, by this reference, incorporated herein as if set forth in full.

Section 2: That there is hereby ENACTED Section 5.7.400, Feeding/Attracting Wildlife Prohibition, to Chapter 7, Animal Control, Title 5, Public Safety, of the McCall City Code, to-wit: See Exhibit "B" attached hereto and, by this reference, incorporated herein as if set forth in full.

Section No. 3: Severability Clause

Should any provision of this Ordinance be declared by a court of competent jurisdiction to be unconstitutional, unlawful or invalid such decision shall only affect the noted provision and shall not affect the validity of the remainder of this Ordinance.

Section No. 4: Directing the City Clerk

The City Clerk is directed to file this Ordinance in the official records of the City and to provide the same to the City's codifier for inclusion and publication in the McCall City Code.

Section No. 5: Effective Date

This Ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage, approval, and publication as required by law and at the discretion of the City Clerk and in lieu of publication of the entire ordinance, a summary thereof in compliance with Section 50-901A, Idaho Code, may be published.

EXHIBIT "A"

5.7.010: DEFINITIONS:

As used in this chapter, each of the terms defined has the meaning given in this section unless a different meaning is clearly required by the context. The word "shall" is mandatory, not directory.

ABUSE: Any case in which an animal has been the victim of intentional or negligent conduct resulting in the animal's bruising, bleeding, malnutrition, dehydration, burns, fractures or breaks of any bones, subdural hematoma, soft tissue swelling, prolonged exposure to the weather elements to the detriment of the animal's health, or death.

ANIMAL: Any organism, other than human being, needing food to maintain and sustain its life and which generally has mobility and a developed central nervous system.

AT LARGE: Off the premises of the owner and not under the control of the owner or person having control or custody either by leash, cord or chain.

ATTRACTING/ATTRACTANT/ATTRACT: When used as a noun, any substance, including but not limited to food, garbage, or salt/mineral/protein lick, which draws wildlife (except those birds and squirrels as identified in this Chapter); When used as a verb, the act of using edible material, attractant, and/or feed in a way that solicits consumption.

BIRDS: Any non-domesticated species belonging to the Order Aves other than Waterfowl and Wild Turkeys.

BITTEN: Seized, pierced, or cut with the teeth or with the jaws, other than when done by a canine puppy less than four (4) months old, in play; and "seized" in this regard means with sufficient force to scratch or bruise, or to pierce, cut or tear clothing.

DEPARTMENT: The McCall police department.

DOG: Either a male or a female member of the biological family Canidae, including Canis familiaris, and including also any other member of that family at any time owned, possessed or harbored, whether neutered or spayed.

DOMESTIC ANIMAL: An animal of a species of vertebrates that has been domesticated by humans so as to live and breed in a tame condition and depend on humankind for survival.

EDIBLE MATERIAL: Any human or animal food, food bi-product, salt/mineral/protein lick, organic material, refuse, or garbage.

ENCLOSURE: A fence or structure of at least six feet (6') in height, forming or causing containment suitable to prevent the unauthorized entry of a person and suitable to confine an animal in conjunction with other measures which may be taken by the owner, such as tethering of

the animal. Such enclosure shall be securely enclosed and locked and designed with secure sides, top and bottom and shall be designed to prevent the animal from escaping.

FEEDING/FEED: When used as a noun, Aa substance composed of grain, mineral, protein, salt, fruit, vegetable, hay, or any other food material or combination of these edible materials, whether natural or manufactured, tended, deposited, or distributed in an area frequented and consumed by wildlife (except those birds and squirrels as identified in this Chapter); When used as a verb, the act of providing edible material, attractant, and/or feed.

FIERCE OR DANGEROUS DOG: A dog (other than a dog belonging to a law enforcement agency and acting pursuant to direction of its law enforcement handler) as described below:

- (A) Fierce: Any dog which bites, inflicts injury, assaults or otherwise attacks a human being or domestic animal without provocation; for purposes of this definition, it is not justification that the human being when bitten was interfering with the dog's attack upon another human being or animal, or has menaced a human being which human being was not on the property of the dog's owner:
- (B) Dangerous Dog: A dog, which was previously declared a "threatening dog" and has displayed repeated violations of potentially dangerous behaviors including, but not limited to, a known propensity, tendency or disposition to attack unprovoked, to cause injury or to otherwise endanger the safety of human beings or domestic animal without provocation.

Notwithstanding the definition of "fierce or dangerous dog" herein, no dog may be declared fierce or dangerous if an injury or damage is sustained by a person who, at the time such injury or damage was sustained, was committing a willful trespass or other tort upon the premises occupied by the owner of the dog, or was teasing, tormenting, abusing or assaulting the dog or was committing or attempting to commit a crime. No dog may be declared fierce or dangerous if the dog was protecting or defending a human being within the immediate vicinity of the dog from an unjustified battery or assault.

HABITUATED: Any wildlife relatively accustomed to eating, resting, birthing, defecating, and otherwise living within city limits - outside of their normally wild habitat. Habituated wildlife may actually cease exhibiting some typical behaviors for that species (e.g. resident deer which do not migrate, mountain lions which den under human structures like porches, etc.).

IMPOUNDED: Taken into the custody of the department's eity pound animal shelter.

MENACE: The threat of harm, confinement or personal injury of a human by an animal.

MISUSE: The intentional causing of an animal to perform a noncustomary task, which could be dangerous or harmful to the animal.

NUISANCE DOG: A dog which barks or creates noise in an excessive, continuous or untimely manner, molests passersby, chases vehicles, habitually attacks other domestic animals, or trespasses upon public or private property in such a manner as to damage the property.

OWNER: Any person owning, possessing, harboring, caring for or having any custodial duties over any dog in his or her control within the city. "Own" means owning, possessing, harboring, caring for, or having in his or her custodial control.

PRIVATE PROPERTY OPEN TO ENFORCEMENT: Includes private property open to the public; condominium or planned unit development (PUD) common area; condominium limited common area which is not reserved for the use of the owner; the common use areas of a mobile home park, or travel trailer court or park; and any other premises with respect to which a person with a right of possession superior to the owner's has invited the department to attend to a matter involving an owner's dog.

<u>PUBLIC EMPLOYEE:</u> Any State or City Employee or certified Peace Officer appointed to carry out and enforce each entity's respective laws and/or ordinances.

RECKLESS/RECKLESSLY: Engaging in conduct with a conscious disregard for the consequences, wherein the person has knowledge of the likely outcome of said conduct.

RESIDENT: An individual who has their primary residence within the McCall city limits.

SQUIRRELS: Any of the commonly found squirrel species (native or non-native) within McCall City limits which are typically associated with native habitats or urban landscapes. E.g., Red Squirrel, Eastern Fox Squirrel, Eastern Gray Squirrel, Chipmunks etc.

THREATENING DOG: A dog, while at large found to menace, chase, display aggressive behavior, or require defensive action by any person to prevent or discourage bodily injury; any dog which unprovoked, has killed, inflicted injury or otherwise caused injury by attacking another domestic animal off the property of the owner or keeper of the dog or upon streets, sidewalks or public grounds. Growling or barking or both together are not grounds upon which a dog can be found to be threatening.

WATERFOWL: Any wild or habituated migratory bird species of the taxonomic Order Anseriformes, Family Anatidae (ducks, geese, swans).

WILD TURKEY: Those species or subspecies of turkey as identified in the *Upland Game*, *Furbearer*, and *Turkey Seasons and Rules* published by the Idaho Department of Fish and Game.

WILDLIFE: Any species of non-domesticated animals as defined in Idaho Code 36-202(g), including, but not limited to: deer, moose, elk, pronghorn, black bear, mountain lion, wolf, coyote, fox, raccoon, skunk, wild turkey, waterfowl, etc. Provided, however, that birds (other than Wild Turkeys and Waterfowl) and squirrels are not considered wildlife under this Chapter.

EXHIBIT "B"

5.7.400 FEEDING/ATTRACTING WILDLIFE PROHIBITION

- A. It is unlawful for any person to intentionally and knowingly feed or attract wildlife (including habituated wildlife) except birds and squirrels, by placing, depositing, distributing, storing, or scattering food, edible material, garbage, feed, or other attractants, with the intent to lure, attract, entice, or feed wildlife on public or private land within the City of McCall.
- B. It is unlawful for any person to recklessly feed or attract wildlife (including habituated wildlife) except birds and squirrels, by allowing access to food, edible material, garbage, feed, or other attractants, which has the effect of luring, attracting, enticing, or feeding wildlife on public or private land within the City of McCall.
- C. Exceptions: This ordinance does not apply to:
 - 1. Public employees or their authorized agents acting pursuant to State of Idaho wildlife management plans or acting within the scope of their authority for wildlife management purposes, or carrying out authorized emergency winter feeding operations, or otherwise carrying out authorized baiting, feeding, or trapping activities in accordance with government authorized wildlife management practices.
 - 2. Any authorized facilities/individuals acting pursuant to State of Idaho and City of McCall permits and licenses responsible or charged with the care of wildlife (i.e. rehabilitation facilities, or authorized and licensed wildlife rehabilitators).
 - 3. Edible material located in a residence, closed vehicle, fully enclosed storage structure, or in an enclosed trash container, where the owner or person in charge has taken reasonable measures to restrict access by wildlife. Full compliance with McCall City Code 5.8.050 shall constitute prima facie evidence that reasonable measures have been taken.
 - 4. A person feeding their own domestic animals as allowed by city ordinances, provided that such food is not left in the open for wildlife to access.
 - 5. Seeds, nectar, and other material to attract birds (other than wild turkey and waterfowl) or squirrels in a feeder placed in such a manner as to make it inaccessible to other wildlife. Feeders shall not be placed in locations in which snow accumulation makes it possible for other wildlife to reach the feeder during the winter months.
 - 6. Compost piles that are fully contained and/or made inaccessible to wildlife.
 - 7. Persons who are engaged in a lawful trapping activity allowing edible bait with all appropriate licenses and/or permits from Idaho Department of Fish and Game and

according to both State of Idaho and City of McCall rules and regulations for such trapping activity; and activities that include lawful recreational trapping of wildlife and lawful trapping of nuisance wildlife by both the public and authorized agents of the State of Idaho, the City of McCall, and the U.S. Department of Agriculture Wildlife Services.

- 8. Persons engaged in lawful fishing activities as authorized by the Idaho Department of Fish and Game.
- 9. Native ornamental plants, vegetable gardens, fruit-bearing trees, flower gardens, lawn, naturally growing vegetation, native vegetation species intentionally cultivated, and the part of those plants or trees and the fruit/berries that fall to the ground from them. Nonnative ornamental and fruit bearing trees shall not be planted, and do not qualify as an exception. Existing ornamental, non-native fruit bearing trees shall be managed to prohibit wildlife (including habituated wildlife) from obtaining the trees' fruit, and therefore, shall be either adequately fenced or maintained with complete harvesting as soon as fruit is available.
- 10. The normal feeding of livestock and/or the practice of raising crops and crop aftermath, including hay, alfalfa and grains, produced, harvested, stored or fed to domestic livestock in accordance with approved agricultural practices within the City of McCall. There is a presumption that on land zoned for agriculture, as defined in Section 3.6.01(A), that the alleged feeding and attraction is exempt from the prohibitions contained in this Section.
- D. Enforcement: A City of McCall Animal Control or Code Enforcement officer, a McCall Police Officer, or any other State of Idaho certified Peace Officer may investigate and issue a warning or citation for a violation of this ordinance. In the event any property shall be found to contain any wildlife or habituated wildlife feed or attractant(s), the feed and attractant(s) shall be removed or secured within two (2) days' notice, unless an alternate time frame is provided by the Officer.
- E. Penalties: Any person found violating this section shall be guilty of an infraction and fined one hundred dollars (\$100.00); provided further, that any person who violates this section for a second or subsequent offense within twelve (12) months after a prior violation of this section shall be subject to the general penalty found in section 1.3.1 of this Code.

A SUMMARY OF ORDINANCE NO. _____ PASSED BY THE CITY OF McCALL, IDAHO

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF McCALL, VALLEY COUNTY, IDAHO, AMENDING TITLE 5, PUBLIC SAFETY, CHAPTER 7, ANIMAL CONTROL, OF THE McCALL CITY CODE, TO-WIT: AMENDING SECTION 5.7.010, DEFINITIONS, ADDING AND SUPPLEMENTING DEFINITIONS; ENACTING SECTION 5.7.400, FEEDING/ATTRACTING WILDLIFE PROHIBITION, PROHIBITING THE FEEDING OR ATTRACTING OF WILDLIFE WITHIN THE McCALL CITY LIMITS; PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR VIOLATIONS; DIRECTING THE CITY CLERK; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

The principal provisions of the Ordinance are as follows:

- Section 5.7.010 adds additional definitions for Attracting/Attractant, Birds, Edible Material, Feeding/Feed, Habituated, Public Employee, Reckless/Recklessly, Squirrels, Waterfowl, Wild Turkey, and Wildlife and amends the definition for Impounded;
- Section 5.7.400, a newly enacted provision, prohibits intentionally and knowingly feeding or attracting of wildlife within the City of McCall. Such prohibitions include the placing, depositing, distributing, storing, or scattering of food, edible material, garbage, feed, or other attractants— with the intent to lure, attract, entice, or feed wildlife. The Ordinance further prohibits reckless actions that have the effect of luring, attracting, enticing, or feeding wildlife.

The Ordinance allows for certain exceptions such as: feeding domestic animals; feeding certain birds and squirrels with specific placements; fully secured compost piles; edible materials stored in secure places; native plants, vegetable gardens, and specific tree types, with certain conditions for existing non-native trees; feeding livestock and practicing approved agricultural activities; licensed trapping and fishing activities; government wildlife management actions; and authorized and licensed facilities or individuals for wildlife care.

If any property is found with wildlife feed or attractants, it must be removed or secured within two (2) days unless the enforcement officer specifies otherwise. Violations constitute an infraction with a penalty of a fine of one-hundred dollars (\$100). Subsequent offenses within twelve (12) months shall be enforced as misdemeanors pursuant to Section 1.3.1 of McCall City Code.

Together, the new amendments and additions to City Code reflect the importance of safeguarding wildlife as a part of McCall's historical and cultural heritage. The new prohibitions are further supported by expert assessments that confirm the act of feeding wildlife is directly associated with adverse consequences, including health deficiencies, disturbances in migratory patterns, and an elevated incidence of disease outbreaks among wildlife. As such,

the City has enacted these prohibitions to ensure the maintenance of a balanced ecosystem for the well-being of all.

RE: Wildlife Education and Outreach Public Hearing Recap

Dear Council Members,

On April 13th, more than 5 months ago, under the direction of the Mayor and Council, we initiated an extensive education and outreach initiative. The main objective of this effort was to improve our grasp of public interest in a wildlife feeding ordinance, raise awareness, and educate both ourselves and the public on the importance of maintaining a balanced wildlife ecosystem within our community.

Over the past several months, our focus has been on involving the community, collecting data, and researching best practices. Here are the key activities and findings:

- 1. Community Conversation Event: We successfully organized a community discussion event with active participation from over 40 residents. This event allowed us to gauge the sentiments and concerns of our community members regarding the wildlife feeding ordinance, giving Council members the opportunity to hear from constituents directly.
- 2. Survey: We conducted a survey and received 54 responses. This survey was a valuable tool for understanding public perspectives and preferences regarding the ordinance.
- 3. Public Comments: In addition to the survey, we received a significant number of public comments, indicating the community's interest and engagement in this matter.
- 4. Research and Documentation: Our team conducted research and compiled relevant data, leading to the collection of white papers and wildlife plans from various communities. We also consulted experts and professionals in the field to ensure our approach aligns with best practices and hosted a Q&A session during a meeting with some of these professionals to interact with City Council.



Based on the input and data collected, several key themes emerged:

- The wildlife feeding ordinance is seen as necessary for the health and safety of our community and wildlife, especially our town's deer population.
- While there is support for the ordinance, there is a consensus against the culling of deer.
- Community members stressed the importance of involving the public in our wildlife-related initiatives and recommended integrating them into our public relations campaigns to make wildlife an integral part of our community's identity and a top priority.

We gained insights from other cities with similar ordinances. Some of these cities have chosen to allocate budgets for a full-time animal control officer as part of their long-term strategies within their law enforcement department.

During each phase of the process a multifaceted process was used to notify the public. Those methods included social media, website news posts, emails, text messages, newspaper advertisements and public notices.

As we move forward, it's important to note that our staff has indicated that if the decision is made to implement this ordinance, we will revisit the matter in the spring of 2024. This follow-up discussion will enable us to assess the outcomes of the ordinance's implementation and explore the need for a long-term plan, strategy, or next steps.

Our comprehensive education and outreach program has made significant strides in understanding public sentiment and the scientific justification behind a wildlife feeding ordinance. We have actively engaged our community and conducted research to ensure a well-informed approach. Going forward, we will continue working to address the concerns and objectives of our community in the realm of wildlife conservation.

A survey with similar open-ended questions will be extended to the entire community to gather information from those not able to attend the public community conversation event.

Wildlife Data:

In lieu of a Wildlife impact study, a selection of already produced articles, whitepapers and comments will be provided to Council as background.

Community Data Matrix:

Staff will collect and provide a matrix that will show data collected from other cities and counties that outlines their wildlife issues as they apply. It will describe steps taken, outcomes achieved, and times lines where applicable.

RE: Wildlife Conversations and Survey

Council Members,

On May 4th, 2023, the City of McCall invited the public to participate in a Community Conversation held at the McCall-Donnelly School Commons. The Community Conversation was well-attended, with over 44 members of the public and the presence of 4 Councilors.

To facilitate meaningful discussions, the attendees were divided into 4 table groups. Each group consisted of a City Council representative, a staff member, and a wildlife biologist, scientist, or expert. Throughout the event, notes were taken, and tables were recorded. We have developed a transcript where available to ensure an accurate representation of the discussions, although some tables had a technical difficulty with transcription. The audio recordings, however, are available upon request.

In preparation for the Community Conversation, a series of 9 questions was developed based on your criteria and the content that required exploration for future action. These questions served as a framework for the discussions and enabled us to focus on key areas of interest. Additionally, following the event, we made a survey available to the wider public through Survey Monkey. The survey, which utilized the same set of questions, received participation from 54 individuals, some of whom had also attended the Community Conversation. The survey allowed respondents to provide additional comments, enriching our understanding of their perspectives.

We have taken the time to process the valuable data collected from both the Community Conversation and the survey. I look forward to presenting the common themes and valuable insights we heard to inform future actions and decisions.


May 4th Wildlife Community Conversation Summary – (Four tables of themes condensed)

Overall Themes and highlights:

- Balance: Need to find a balance between human activities and the preservation of wildlife, with a focus on mitigating the negative impacts of human behavior on the ecosystem.
- Population management: The impact of a feeding ordinance is discussed, with concerns about the potential starvation of deer due to limited natural forage. The suggestion of humanely culling deer and donating the meat to local families is raised as an alternative.
- Problem urgency: The urgency of addressing the deer issue is emphasized, as participants
 discuss the growth of the deer population and the potential risks, such as Chronic Wasting
 Disease (CWD).
- Safety and accidents: The high number of deer-vehicle collisions is seen as a failure of the city to warn drivers effectively. Suggestions include placing signs and providing educational materials to rental management companies.
- Partnering with specific organizations. Although there is some debate about the trustworthiness and dependability of Fish and Game to manage wildlife.
- Ensuring the City is getting its information about wildlife, specifically deer, from trusted sources such as experts, wildlife management organizations, local fish and game departments, and personal observations.
- Lack of public awareness and education: There is a concern about the public's lack of
 understanding regarding the consequences of feeding deer. Education and awareness campaigns
 are seen as necessary to address this issue. The need for the city to balance education and
 enforcement in addressing wildlife issues. There is a recognition of the need to balance different
 aspects, such as avoiding sign clutter, considering code management, and finding creative
 solutions that are both effective and visually appealing. Many believed a more robust campaign
 approach was necessary possibly integrated in the city's overall mission.
- Formation of a wildlife committee: Opinions vary on whether a committee is needed to address
 wildlife-related issues. Some believe it would delay action, while others see it as a way to gather
 knowledge and research from other towns facing similar challenges. Most believe the formation
 of a committee should be isolated to professionals in the field, while others stressed the need
 for citizen input.
- Management and decision-making: There is a focus on the need for proactive management of
 wildlife, particularly deer, wolves, and cougars. The decision-making process should be ongoing
 and based on expert advice. Participants expressed concerns about the lack of wildlife studies
 and environmental impact assessments in the community's development plans. They discuss
 how fragmented and disturbed habitats can lead to various issues beyond just the deer
 population.
- Ordinance Support: Although some stated they believed deer could be fed if citizens were taught safely, most believed in and supported an ordinance with meaningful fines.
- The general feeling from all of the comments is that there is an issue that needs to be addressed.
 People agreed that consultations should be sought with experts and municipalities dealing with wildlife issues.

I see the deer foraging throughout the winter, and yes quite a few young deer die, but the non-town deer who live out in undeveloped parts of the county also die in fairly large numbers. What I would deeply resent is the Dept. of Fish and Game culling large numbers of town deer while ignoring the health of non town deer, and while spending lots of money on town culling when the department has been crying for many years that they don't have the budget to relocate bears or cougars who become overly familiar with living in town. Why does F&G have the budget to cull town deer, but not humanly deal with bears before they become a problem? For example. I think culling the deer is more humane than letting them starve or eat everyone's landscaping.

IF they are found to be struggling or starving to death, don't just shoot them in the city, or round them up and slaughter them like Idaho did with the rabbits or coyotes in the 80's and 90's (Great way to way to KILL TOURISM in One Easy Step). Rather do what all surrounding States to Idaho do: They have "emergency feeding" sites for the deer to help them through a tough winter. Our town deer are ON their wintering range here. That is the ONLY TRULY HUMANE thing to do. NOT KILL THEM because no one wants to actually DO THE TOUGH WORK, Given the above horrible question: NO. I AM NOT FOR A FEEDING ORDINANCE. Particularly IF the "no feed ordinance" has an attached fish and game agenda ordinance giving fish and game the go-ahead to kill the town deer like two and a half years ago, then I am adamantly against it. Who is going to police an ordinance if one is put in place? The lone city code enforcer? The police department? Why not focus on the ordinances that are ALREADY on the books? Speeders, inattentive driving, illegal drug use, off leash dogs, etc, etc. If the police can't issue speeding tickets for fear of driving out tourists, then what do you think a feeding ordinance will do when someone is jailed for feeding a carrot or apple to a deer? And what is considered "feeding"? A beautifully planted yard full of beautiful green grass? Newly planted fruit trees on homeowners properties? Ornamental non-native landscaping and bushes/trees planted in yards that the deer LOVE? Colorful flower baskets and vegetable gardens? Hanging bird feeders? Even if placed 50 feet up in a tree? (Squirrels and even birds are messy feeders, so the spray birdseed allll over on the ground where deer can easily reach it. Is *that * considered "feeding". The deer are simply "collateral damage" so to speak if they can reach the birdseed intended for birds and squirrels, right? Kind of like the golf course spreading poison like confetti that is intended for "voles". The collateral damage is far more serious than deer getting birdseed. The collateral damage of rodenticide poisoning is the State protected ground squirrels on the golf course, and ANY secondary wildlife that eats a staggering poisoned vole or ground squirrel (domestic cats, dogs, Eagles, Owls, all other birds and raptors, Fox, Bears, Coyotes)...ALL can die by eating poisoned voles and ground squirrels. Why isn't THAT being talked about? IF a feeding ordinance is put in place, it needs to be a PILOT STUDY ONLY, with a minimum of a year to three years of collected data on any impact on the wildlife and deer (which is what you are really talking about here, right)? The handouts deer get in the winter by locals, 2nd homeowners, tourists, and visitors is simply NOT enough to sustain them. The deer are obviously finding plenty of native foods (trees, fruit trees, grasses, brush, gardens, etc) to survive our winters. They have always been here (again since I was a child in the 60's), and have found ways to adapt to our winters. It's not due to the

"feeders". I can guarantee you that VERY few residents of McCall have the extra money to properly feed the deer, even a small herd of 10 or 20 can costs thousands of dollars in a single winter in cobb molasses oats or hav or seed. Do I believe that the deer will simply be dropping dead in our streets if an ordinance is passed? No. But Regan Berkley is spreading that unfounded fear. The old, weak, very young, or even orphaned deer might succumb naturally to a harsh winter. That is nature. The deer just endured a very LONG winter...7 months of snow on the ground. The majority found enough native foods to survive. Many look skinny or "mangy" which is normal this time of year, is it not? And particularly so after a very long winter. I have a database of thousands of photos of the deer in McCall over the past 12 years in EVERY MONTH OF EVERY YEAR. Thousands, THAT is "historical data" if you need it. Why doesn't fish and game have this data? Twelve plus years of photos show the health of the deer population in McCall. At the end of winter, they "look" unhealthy. A few "may" die. Most will survive. And IF the deer actually are found to be "starving" if an ordinance is put in place, then do what every other State and fish and game department surrounding us does: FEED THE DEER in a safe location so they make it through tough winters. Not watch them suffer or die or simply KILL THEM....Again, WHAT LEGACY DO YOU ALL WANT TO LEAVE, AND WHAT LEGACY DO YOU WANT FOR MCCALL TO LEAVE? A town devoid of deer and wildlife? What a horrible thought and horrible future for McCall...
